COUNTRY ON PREPAREDNESS.

A babel of opinions is heard throughout the land to the bewilderment of the citizens and legislators, on what is considered by many as "the most important question before the American people since the Civil war." You read of ardent advocates of national defense wanting an army and navy big enough to "lick the world and keep it licked."

Their stand is revolting to those of pacifist leaning who claim that after the European War we will be safe because that great conflict will keep hitherto powerful nations "bled white" and unable to fight again for fifty or a hundred years.

In order to explore and map out this jungle of conflicting opinions, the Literary Digest made inquiry of five hundred editors in every state of the Union on three points:

How large an army should we have?

How large a navy?

Is there any reason to fear the peril of militarism in increasing both branches of our defense?

In the Literary Digest for March 11 the result of the nation-wide poll is given. It presents a graphic and correct gauge of public opinion on this tense subject. There are replies from every state classified geographically from the Atlantic Seaboard, the Gulf Region, the Central States, the Far West, and the Pacific Slope.

Advertisement for Street Improvement.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. March 22, 1916, for the improvement of Washington Street from the South line of Ninth Street to the North curb line of Thirteenth Street, in the City of Albany.

Said improvement to be made in the following manner to-wit:

First. By grading said street to the proper subgrade.

Second. By paving the roadway of said street full width with full intersections with asphaltic concrete pavement on an asphaltic concrete foundation.

Third. By laying and constructing asphaltic concrete headers.

Fourth. By constructing catch basins.

Fifth. By constructing inlets.

Sixth. By laying vitrified sewer pipe.

Seventh. By tapping of main and lateral sewers.

Said improvement to be made in accordance with the Charter and ordinances of the said City of Albany, and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the City Recorder, where said plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8:00 o'clock p. m. March 22, 1916.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid, to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in a sum equal to 30 per cent of the amount to be paid under such contract, for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of award of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said improvement prior to the first day of August, 1916, under a liquidated penalty for damages of \$25.00 for each day of delay beyond that period.

The council reserves the right to reject all bids deemed unreasonable.
