VILLA AS A HERO.

This Mexican squabble back at Washington is getting a little more interesting every day. The papers are taking part in it in all manner of forms. Here is one from the Salem Journal that is at least spicy:

Senator Chamberlain's little buncomb speech in the senate yesterday about Villa becoming a "national hero" and rallying 60,000 trained soldiers under his banner is about as silly as anything we have heard for some time past—and many silly things are being uttered in these days when statesmen ought instead to show cooler judgment and higher courage. We heard the same Mexican bluffs and threats when the Americans landed at Vera Cruz and yet within a month the natives were apparently all on our side. It will work out the same way in this Villa campaign if properly handled, because there is no Mexican army—just a lot of half starved, ill-equipped ragamuffin bands, the members of which are fighting because there seems to be nothing else to do in the republic. In the first Mexican war, it only required an army of 10,000 men to march from one end of the republic to the other, capturing all their strongholds, although the Mexican forces outnumbered it ten to one. History will repeat itself this year and Funston's little army, if it is necessary, can march from the Rio Grande to Mexico City and back again, defeating any and every force that may gather to oppose it.

PERSISTENT CORRESPONDENT

Journal: Just when General Funston is about ready to begin operations, a small army of newspaper correspondents, some fifty in number, broke out in open rebellion because the general did not take them into his confidence and let them publish his plans. A few days in the guard house on bread and water, and not much bread either would probably quell the rebellion. If he would keep three-fourths of them locked up until the trouble is over there would be less conflict in the news coming from the front.

"The biggest service that the newspaper can render the community is to serve human welfare," said Marshall J. Dana, writer on the Oregon Journal. "A newspaper can be the betrayer of the public trust, it can be a deceiver, it can appeal to baser human passion to enlarge its subscription list, or on the other hand it can be one of the constructive forces of society, organizing public thought in matters that are local, state and national in character. Advertisement for Street Improvement.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. March 22, 1916, for the improvement of Washington Street from the South line of Ninth Street to the North curb line of Thirteenth Street, in the City of Albany.

Said improvement to be made in the following manner to-wit:

First. By grading said street to the proper subgrade.

Second. By paving the roadway of said street full width with full inter-sections with asphaltic concrete pavement on an asphaltic concrete foundation.

Third. By laying and constructing asphaltic concrete headers.

Fourth. By constructing catch basins.

Fifth. By constructing inlets.

Sixth. By laying vitrified sewer pipe.

Seventh. By tapping of main and lateral sewers.

Said improvement to be made in accordance with the Charter and ordinances of the said City of Albany, the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the City Recorder, where said plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained. Bids will be opened at 8:00 o'clock p. m. March 22, 1916.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid, to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in a sum equal to 50 per cent of the amount to be paid under such contract, for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of award of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said improvement prior to the first day of August, 1916, under a liquidated penalty for damages of \$25.00 for each day of delay beyond that period.

The council reserves the right to reject all bids deemed unreasonable.
