QUELLING VILLA.

The matter of quelling Villa and his gang of bandits should be a business proposition, one carried out carefully, without bravado or jingoism. It isn't going to take a very large army to do what can be done. The principal thing is to get track of Villa, the desperado. The rest should not be hard. He has a very poor equipment, hardly any ammunition, not much to fight with. His backing is comparatively small. He is as big a menace to the Mexican government as to that of the United States, hence the probability of a united campaign against him by the Carranzistas and our soldiers. Perhaps there will be a race to get him first. Even if all Mexico should unite against the United States it would not be a very serious matter to take the whole country, very little stronger now than in 1849 from a military standpoint. It is not a matter for concern, and may prove something with a compensation.

HELPS HUMANITY.

In the April American Magazine is an account of America's only penniless-millionaire who amassed an enormous fortune through delivering one lecture on will power over five thousand times. This man is Dr. Russell H. Conwell, pastor of a Philadelphia church, who balances his books at the end of every month, pays his bills and scatters the residue to the last cent over his charity list. If the money he has amassed through lecturing were put out at five per cent he would be worth over five million dollars today. "Men often travel a hundred miles to hear Dr. Conwell's lecture for the fifteenth or twentieth time, and they always get a fresh inspiration, they tell him. It has harnessed rivers, built banks, irrigated deserts, and supplied weary hearts with brand-new dynamo. Audiences in every state in the Union, in Europe, Asia and Africa, have heard it, and the lecturer turned down an offer of fifty thousand dollars for a six months' antipodary tour in Australia and New Zealand."

DEAD LETTER SPEED LAWS.

"The legal speed limits in American cities," says Frederick Upham Adams, "range from twelve to twenty miles an hour. Such limits never have been enforced, and never will be enforced, for reasons which will be considered in detail in the next article. The real traffic regulations of our larger cities, as daily enforced by the police, make it obligatory with the driver of an automobile to maintain speeds of from twenty to twenty-two miles an hour on streets with heavy traffic when the driver gets the signal that there is a clear space ahead. The law may set the minimum at fifteen, but you must run at twenty when you have a chance. Unless such a high speed be generally maintained by drivers whenever possible on main city thoroughfares, effective traffic regulation will be impossible and disastrous congestion chronic and inevitable. "We have reached a period in the development of the automobile in the United States when the traffic authorities are more concerned over a minimum speed which must be maintained whenever possible than over maximum speeds."

Improvement.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. March 22, 1916, for the improvement of Washington Street from the South line of Ninth Street to the North curb line of Thirteenth Street, in the City of Albany.

Said improvement to be made in the following manner to-wit:

First. By grading said street to the proper subgrade.

Second. By paving the roadway of said street full width with full intersections with asphaltic concrete pavement on an asphaltic concrete foundation.

Third. By laying and constructing asphaltic concrete headers.

Fourth. By constructing catch basins.

Fifth. By constructing inlets.

Sixth. By laying vitrified sewer pipe.

Seventh. By tapping of main and lateral sewers.

Said improvement to be made in accordance with the Charter and ordinances of the said City of Albany.

The plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the City Recorder, where said plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 8:00 o'clock p. m. March 22, 1916.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid, to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in a sum equal to 50 per cent of the amount to be paid under such contract, for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of award of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said improvement prior to the first day of August, 1916, under a liquidated penalty for damages of \$25.00 for each day of delay beyond that period.
