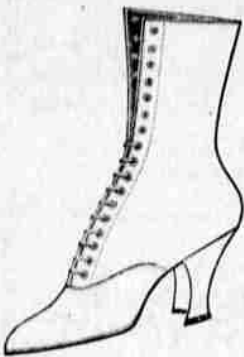

Southern Pacific Issues Book on Walnut Culture in Western Oregon.

The Southern Pacific has recently issued a handsomely illustrated book "Oregon Walnuts." The text was written by Mr. C. L. Lewis, chief, division of Horticulture, Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oregon.

The cover plate shows a collection of Oregon walnuts in natural colors. The interior pictures are taken from various walnut orchards throughout Western Oregon, and show in addition to general views, technical illustration of grafting, pruning, budding, etc.

Prof. Lewis has covered the walnut industry very thoroughly in this book, and it should be in the hands of every walnut grower in this state.

Throughout the book are chapters on the following very interesting subjects: Choosing the Orchard; Sprouting the Seed; Grafting; Establishing the Orchard; Setting the Trees; Pruning; Diseases; Insects; Varieties of Walnuts.

BIG BOOST FOR MINING.

High Prices Have Increased the Business in Oregon Four Hundred Per Cent.

Portland, March 20.—(By United Press)—Soaring prices of metal due to the enormous demand from Europe has boomed mining operations throughout the Pacific Northwest as never before.

Comparative value of the total metal production of the state of Oregon for three years shows graphically what the war demand has done. These figures, according to H. M. Parks, director of the Oregon bureau of mines and geology, are as follows:

1915—\$750,000.
1915—\$2,000,000.
1916—\$3,000,000 (Estimated).

Old abandoned mines in many sections have been reopened.

The week was proclaimed at the request of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs.

\$500,000,000 IN GOLD.

This Amount is Locked in the Vaults of the United States Mint at Denver, Colo.

Denver, Col., March 16.—The largest single gold supply in the world—about \$500,000,000—is locked in the vaults of the Denver mint today. The vaults that hold this enormous wealth are among the strongest and with the most intricate locking and time devices, in the world. They are considered burglar and bomb proof. Contrary to expectations, the great wealth in the building visited by thousands annually as a point of interest to tourists is not guarded by a large number of armed men. A few old soldiers, political appointees, are practically in charge of the building. In an emergency hardly a corporal's guard of powerful, armed men could be raised in the mint immediately. But the strength of the vaults and their inaccessibility gives the officials charged with responsibility for the half billion dollars no worry. The government accepts all gold offered at the mint. The price is fixed, \$20.67 a fine ounce. It has not fluctuated in years. The same price rules all over the world. None of the gold which has poured into New York since the balance of trade has been in America's favor has been stored in Denver. According to officials at the local mint, that gold mostly remains in the New York and Washington mints and eastern banks as a basis for credit. In case of threatened invasion, however, it is not improbable that the gold on both the Atlantic and Pacific seaboard would be removed to the strong Denver vaults.

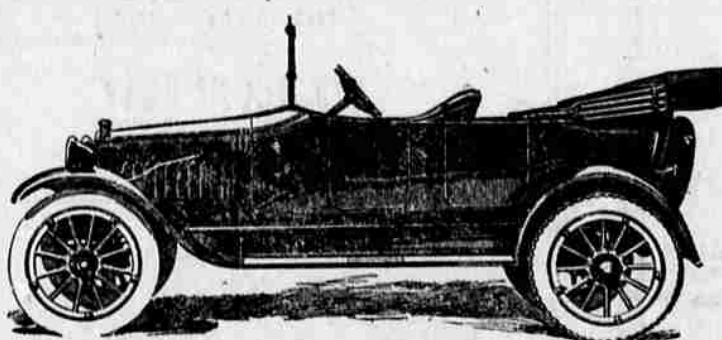
