#### "BATTLE CRY OF PEACE" COMING HERE TOMORROW

The appearance of "The Battle Cry of Peace" at the Rolfe Theatre Wednesday and Thursday is an event extraordinary in the moving picture world. #### Suit to Foreclose—

It is to be two stories, with a living basement, practically three stories, of the bungalow type. Mrs. Rich expects to live in the lower floor and rent the upper stories, to be arranged in apartments. It will cost about \$5000, probably the most costly residence in Newport. Mrs. Rich is owner of the saw mill at Devett, and already owns a number of cottages at Newport. Mr. Clem will begin work as soon as the weather permits ready for summer visitors.

#### CARLE ABRAMS OF S. I. A. C. GAVE ADDRESS AT EUGENE

Carl Abrams, of the state industrial accident commission, passed through the city on his way home from Eugene, where yesterday afternoon he presented the work of the commission, which is not thoroughly understood by many, giving his address to the students of the U. O. On account of the delay in the train he did not arrive until 3 p. m. Mr. Abrams gave a very exhaustive review of the work of the commission. The total amount paid out or set aside last year was \$370,200.46, while the operative expenses were almost \$450,000, making a total of approximately \$820,000.
