COLE YOUNGER DEAD.

Famous Bandit After Eventful Career Died a Reformed Man, in Missouri.

A death this week that attracts wide attention is that of Cole Younger, at Lee's Summit, Mo., at the age of 72 years. Younger was the last of three brothers famous as bandits and highwaymen, who operated with the James brothers on some of the most daring robberies in the history of the country, twelve or fifteen in all, closing in 1876 with the robbery of the First National Bank, at Northfield, Minn., of which the uncle of the editor of the Democrat was president, and in which a sister is now employed. The Younger brothers were all captured and sentenced to life imprisonment at Stillwater, Minn. One, Bob, died in the penitentiary and Cole and James were paroled in 1901. James shot himself in 1902. Cole remained in Minnesota three years and then went to Missouri, among other things lecturing. In August, 1913, he was converted at a revival, getting back where he started, for he was brought up in a Christian home.

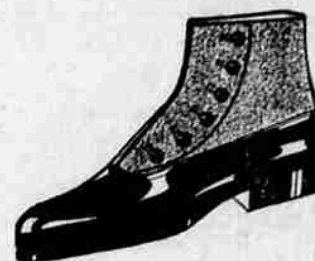

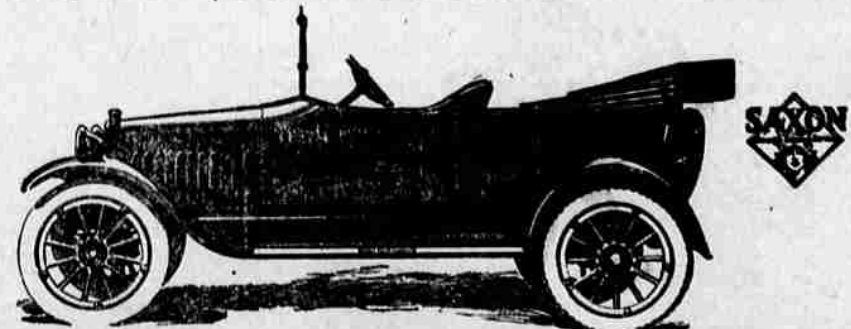
