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WHAT ONE MAN CAN DO.

"Oregon has a vital fault, that is found from one end of the state to the other, in the barrenness of its rural life. This includes not only Burns and that portion of the state, but also applies to Salem, Eugene and Medford," said A. H. Harris, of the Portland Evening Telegram, in speaking to University students yesterday on "Leadership," and making an appeal to them to prepare themselves to become leaders.

"Ontario's development has followed one man," said Mr. Harris. "It is a new and comparatively poor community now, but it has progressed wonderfully. McMinnville, situated in a rich and what will be one of the richest sections of the state, has barely been marking time for the past 10 or 15 years. Its leaders are in banks and they have no community leader.

"Hood River a few years ago had developed a real intellectual center perhaps the greatest in the state at that time, but its leaders have left. Conditions there now are really deplorable, considered from a leadership standpoint. Medford is in a peculiar condition. It has two types of leaders. One is a banker who is very rich and is the financial leader. The other is a man who came there from the east and is in business. Their interests conflict. Medford has progressed wonderfully but one-sidedly and not on a safe basis.

"In eastern Oregon 'Bill' Hanley is the one saving grace in that section. His leadership has been safe and sound and he has been recognized as such. He was educated in the school of hard knocks, but his impress will be there 200 years from now.

"So it is over the state," said Mr. Harris. "In years past Oregon has had leaders of the crude, unschooled and natural type which will be replaced by an intellectual type. Every community needs a leader more than any one thing, I should say.

"I am sorry to say that the right kind of a leader has not been developed in Portland. If it had, it would have radiated out over the state. Leadership cannot be bottled up. It will spread out. You students ought to prepare for leadership and with the opportunities you have you can and should never excuse yourself with the saying that you did not have a chance. Ninety-nine out of every 100 that I meet in this world who fail, give this excuse."
