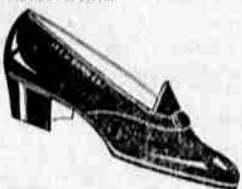

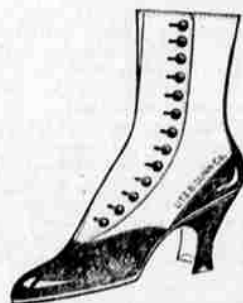

FAMOUS BLUE BUCKET MINE.

Baker City Men Think They Have Rediscovered Placer Mine of Marvelous Wealth.

The famous Blue Bucket mine, over the other side of the Cascades, which has caused a great deal of talk for years, has again been discovered. One of the original discoverers of the mine was the late Mr. Davis, father of Willard Davis and Mrs. Ed. Schoel, of this city. Mr. Davis himself helped to hunt for the mine, without result, and Dr. Hill, of this city, has made a thorough investigation of it, years ago writing an article on the much wanted mine of gold nuggets. The following from Baker City will be of interest: Relocation of the Blue Bucket mine, known in Oregon legend as the richest gold prospect in the northwest, is expected J. W. Buckley and K. C. Harpan, of this city, who believe they have discovered the location sought in vain by prospectors for more than 60 years.

According to tradition, the diggin's rich in virgin gold are in the Prineville country and were worked in 1849 by a party of immigrants, who, after a short stay, were driven out by Indians. All efforts to relocate the gold deposits have been in vain.

The place found by Mr. Buckley and Mr. Harpan, Mr. Buckley says, tallies well with the description furnished by legend. According to the story, a woman of the party died and was buried before the immigrants left. The Baker men found a rude headstone on a neglected grave, bearing the inscription "Mary E. —, 1849."

Further fixing the date were two old linchpin wagons. An ancient pick was found, its handle warped almost to a semi-circle, while a dilapidated cabin bore the same marks of age characterizing the wagons. Since boxes, much the worse for wear, were noted, and a frying pan, hand-made from a piece of sheet steel, was brought back.

The discovery was made late in November, but has been kept quiet until the finders are now nearly ready to start back.

MILLIONAIRE BEING TRIED.

Is Charged With Violation of the Mann Act, His Accuser Being a Former Stenographer.

(By United Press)
Chicago, March 27.—After many delays and postponements, William Rufus Edwards, millionaire St. Paul lumberman, went to trial here today, charged with having violated the Mann Act.

Ada M. Cox, a stenographer who once sued Edwards for breach of promise, is the principal witness against him. Edwards has secured several continuances from the federal court; once because of his wife was approaching motherhood, next because of his baby's illness, and finally, early this month, because he himself was suffering from nervous prostration.

Edwards' counsel planned to attack Miss Cox's character, it was said, and has arranged for transportation for 25 witnesses from many places to Chicago.

Miss Cox was a stenographer employed in a Chicago coal office. She declared she was transported to St. Paul by Edwards, in 1912, and that Edwards promised to marry her. She won a \$17,500 verdict in her breach of promise case.

New War Secretary Met His Wife in 1901 at a Wedding and at Once Fell in Love.

Philadelphia, March 27.—Residents of these parts, especially those of Chester county, will not permit Cleveland to claim without challenge all the affiliations with the new secretary of war, Newton D. Baker. The war secretary's wife is the daughter of Howard Leopold of Pottstown, Pa., and Baker, himself, to many persons in the vicinity of the old Leopold homestead, is familiarly "Newt."

Mrs. Baker met her husband in 1901 at the wedding of a college chum in Chambersburg, Pa. She was a bridesmaid and Baker was the best man. It did not take incorrigible Dan Cupid long to victimize the couple and on July 5, 1902, Miss Bessie Leopold became Mrs. Newton D. Baker.

Mrs. Baker graduated from Wilson College in 1895 and from that year until she was married taught music and art at the institution. While she has not lived in Pottstown for the last 14 years, everybody there remembers her. Before her marriage she was a leading figure in the town's social, religious and charitable life.
