MAIL ORDER PLUNDER.

An Albany business man calls this a good one on the mail order business.

A Chicago mail order house recently shipped 21 car loads of mail order catalogues into Washington, Idaho and Montana, by freight, and mailed them into first and second zones at parcel post rates. Let us say there were 100,000 catalogues. They cost \$100,000 to produce them. The mailing cost \$7,300.

Now what did it cost the United States government to transport the big fat catalogues over the mountain roads of three states? Is there any man foolish enough to believe Uncle Sam broke even?

And where were these books printed, bound, addressed and stamped? Why in Chicago, of course.

And to think that our people will pay the printer, the binder, the wrapper, the addresses, the freight, the postman, and a nice slice of profit to the plunderers.

Are we not a great people? Can any nation hope to surpass our generosity and assiduity?

No, I reckon not.

SIGNIFICANT MOVE.

The Boston Herald has made a suggestion that is very striking and significant. Here it is:

Why did the Kaiser let von Tirpitz go? That is a question which even the German people are themselves not able to answer at the present moment. Hints have come from Berlin and suggestions from London, but these may be dismissed as wholly wild of the mark. Everyone who has followed the course of German politics during the past ten years knows that Tirpitz was not ousted to satisfy a whim of the Emperor, or to please America, or because Herr Ballin desired it, or for any other such reason. He has been a towering figure in German official life; through the Navy League which he created and fostered he still possesses a tremendous political following. He has not been shuffled off without some considerations which would be of the greatest interest if the world could know the truth.

The fundamental fact is, however, that the Tirpitz plan of sea warfare has proved a failure. The policy of attrition, or of picking off English war vessels one by one has come to nothing. The much-vaunted submarine campaign has not interfered with the communications between England and France, nor has it shut off in the slightest degree the enormous flow of munitions from America. Whatever her way of doing it may be, there is evidence in the ordinary course of events that Britain is hounding the German submarines out of the travel routes. The figures of growth in English naval strength recently given by Mr. Balfour are of the greatest significance. A million fighting tons have been added, he tells us, since the war began. Assuming that only a fifth of this has been in light craft, it would mean the addition of more than 200 destroyers of the type which has proved most useful in submarine hunting. It is altogether probable that England has today more than 500 torpedo boats and destroyers in active service. What a gauntlet to run on the way to Channel or to the Mersey!

It may be that the German fleet still intends to issue forth before long and give battle. But the Tirpitz episode does not point in that direction. The man who created the fleet would not be dismissed at this juncture if things were going smoothly.
