ALBANY MAN GETS CONTRACT FOR NEW U. O. BUILDING

N. E. Hoover is Awarded Con-
tract in Competition With
Nearly Thirty Bidders.

At the meeting of the building committee of the board of regents of the State University, at Eugene Saturday night, the contract for the new \$40,000 educational building was awarded to N. E. Hoover, of Albany, whose bid was between \$30,000 and \$31,000. The building committee is A. C. Dixon and Ray Goodrich. Speaking of the committee's action, Mr. Dixon said:

"Of the 30 bids considered, it was definitely determined that the bid of Mr. Hoover was the lowest. Just what the final figures will be depends on a conference we will have with Mr. Hoover next Tuesday night, when we will determine certain construction materials."

The new \$40,000 structure will house the educational school, the law school, the law library and possibly a junior high school, where the students in education can gain practical experience in teaching. The building will be built so that additional units can be added as the necessity requires. It will be located on the western edge of the campus. Construction work will start within the next two weeks.

Mr. Hoover built the junior high school building at this city, which speaks for his splendid workmanship. He is a worker who will do a good job for the state.
