Friday and Saturday, April 21-22, are the dates set for the production in this city of the great morality play, "Damaged Goods."

Although somewhat in the distance high school, and college students and lovers of English literature, as well as those interested in good drama, will look forward to the presentation in this city of George Eliott's great novel, "Silas Marner." A pleasing part of this production is the appearance in the cast of Frederick Warde, one of the world's greatest Shakespearean actors. The dates set are May 29-30.

The next Metro play to follow this

week's production will feature Ethel Barrymore in "The Final Judgment."

Albany people will have the opportunity tonight for the first time to see Mme. Olga Petrova, the noted emotional actress. She is starred in one of Rupert Hughes' latest popular novels, "What Will People Say?"

"Fair and Warmer" is the title of a play produced by Selwin & Co., who produced "Twin Beds" here last winter. This play will probably be seen in Albany in a few months.

Charlie Chaplin's new Mutual-Chaplin will begin to be released next month. Rex Beach's famous story of "The Ne'er Do Well," will be seen at the Hub soon.

Market Report Union Stock Yard.

Portland, April 3.—Cattle—Cattle market remained steady with the close of last week. Three loads of grain fed and four loads of pulp fed steers went at the high price of \$9. One load of pulp fed cows sold at \$7.65 while a split load went at \$7.80, the highest price paid for cows this season. The run was good almost 100 being counted in, and buying was active.

Hogs—A very light run of 2900 hogs came to market Monday. Buyers were inclined to rest and the market was inactive in the forenoon. Hog prices were lowered to the \$9.20 mark. A five cent drop under last week's close. Bulk went at \$9.00 to \$9.15.

Sheep—No receipts in the sheep section, market very strong. Anything of quality would command a premium. Spring lambs are quoted at \$13. Prime lambs at \$10.50. Ewes at \$8.25. Wethers \$9.25 and yearlings \$10.
