WHAT ABOUT DAD?

The articles in The Daily News on the allotment garden movement of England, bring vividly to mind a national neglect. We have made inadequate provision for recreation among adults. Most folks think that play is for children, golf for the well-to-do, and clubs for the leisure classes. Moreover, walking is a bore on city pavements and moving pictures do not satisfy the head of the household. Running a jitney is limited to the owner of the motor car. At the Carnegie library he is overawed by the austere person who would direct his reading, so what can an average American daddy do except remain at home, smoke his pipe, read his paper, and rust out in working for the family?

The articles by our special commissioner show that the English daddies are doing to avoid the rusting out process. The articles tell graphically how the city garden movement is providing a form of recreation that formerly was impossible.

A city garden! In America thousands of men and women will welcome such a movement! The man who carries delicious memories of Saturday afternoon spent in the garden will always have a love for the soil and desire to return to it. Even while toiling at a city job, he carries the love of that garden spot, curiously mingled, somehow, with memories of an aching back in potato digging time.

To those who carry such memories, the city garden movement brings a chance to give their youngsters an experience of the kind of life that the daddies used to lead.—Minneapolis Times.

NEW INDUSTRIES.

The following from the Pendleton E. O., is a sample of what a new industry will do for a city:

As shown by a new story in the East Oregonian yesterday the Blewett Harvester company has brought 12 new families to Pendleton. That means 12 more houses occupied (though where they are to be found is a mystery) it means 12 more patrons for local stores, churches and schools.

Best of all these people are all producers and the money that goes to meet the company's payroll comes from outside of Pendleton. It will come from the wheat farmers of Eastern Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The company's payroll will be approximately \$25,000 a year and practically all of that money will be spent in Pendleton.

Pendleton people put up the sum of \$25,000 to insure the location of this harvester plant here. The community will get that sum back from the company each year.

It is the sort of business that makes for permanent local growth.
