The Barcan club of the Christian church held an interesting meeting on Monday. The games and program were suggestive of April Fool's day.

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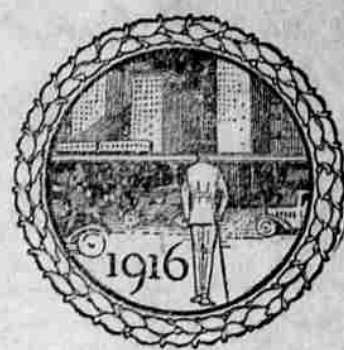
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and many clever pranks were played. An elaborate banquet was served.

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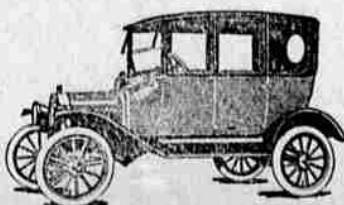
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
