WALNUT CONTEST ARRANGED.

Judges to Be Sixteen Boys and Girls Who Do not Use Tobacco or Gum.

Telegram: Girls whose sense of taste has not been impaired by gum chewing and boys who have not touched their lips to tobacco will be eligible to serve on a jury of tasters of walnuts. This plan of determining the best quality of walnuts grown in Oregon, Washington, California and Idaho has been determined upon by the Western Walnut Association's committee on taste and quality of nuts to be submitted to the second annual meeting November 1 to 3 at North Yakima. The verdict of the juvenile jury of 16 will be recorded on ballots provided for the purpose. Two-pound samples of each variety will be invited from all walnut growers in the four states entering the contest.

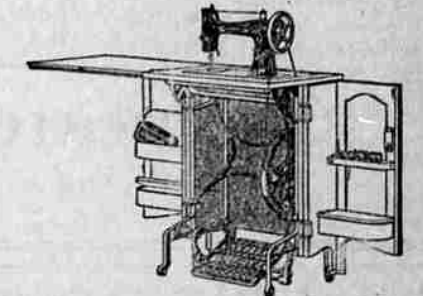
