THE SUBJECT OF PROSPERITY.

Even though we have not felt it here as elsewhere the Democrat is glad of the opportunity to publish everything reliable that points to a general return of prosperity in business circles in the United States, realizing the fact that this state with its unsurpassed resources, must, in the long run, reap the benefit of it. The depression hit us long after it had affected the east. Naturally the return of prosperity here is slower, but it is coming, and just as forcefully, regardless of the fact that we are short in manufacturing establishments. The following from the Journal is convincing:

It is doubtful if American prosperity was ever so fully in the flood tide as today.

Even the Washington Post, a formidable spokesman of reaction, admits it. It says:

From Coast to coast, from Hawaii to Porto Rico, from the Lakes to the Rio Grande, never did their exist so many people, nor so many busy people, nor so many people enjoying prosperity, as at this writing.

It is not New England that prosperity is confined to; it is not New York and Pennsylvania and New Jersey alone that enjoy good times; it is not only Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and Illinois that are distributing millions of dollars weekly in payrolls to busy employes, but in every section of the Union heavy payrolls, good times and well diffused prosperity is the order of the day.

Nor does the Post confine its statements to things as they are. It not only insists that the countrywide prosperity is unexampled but it voices notes of optimism for the future. It says:

Confidence in the future exists in all our business circles. Uncertainty has no place in the counsels of those circles today. The business energies of the nation have at last their opportunity for their full development, and we behold the result in this ever rising tide of prosperity which is sweeping our country, but has not nearly approached its maximum volume, power or height.

The new birth of freedom for American business is beginning to yield results. The great currency and banking act has helped start the wheels of industry. It stands as a guarantee against panics. The mere fact that it was about to go into operation created a confidence that withstood the fear-fur strain thrust upon American finances by the breaking out of the European war.

The control of credit is no longer in a few hands. The source of American credit is no longer that selfish and tyrannical district that we know as Wall Street.

American credit is no longer subject to the will of a few New Yorkers. As a country, we are free from Caesarism in finance. Twelve great regional banks scattered throughout the country are the fountains from which business and enterprise receive their lifeblood. The commercial paper of the country is an asset to give elasticity to currency and provide for any enlargement of business activity.

The financial and commercial world of America knows now that the government is safeguarding business by defending it through the currency system against the unscrupulous cornermen of Wall street. They know that there is a new birth of freedom for American business.

The war, of course, has given impetus to a few American activities. But it has brought heavy handicaps. It has tied up millions of tonnage in ships. It has vastly increased the price of ocean freights. It has cut off many markets. It put a frightful strain on American finance. With its disadvantages deducted from its benefits, the war is to be credited with but a fraction of the great prosperity of Amer-

ica. More than all the influences of the war, greater than all other influences combined in setting American industry and business into an unparalleled activity are the banking and currency act and the mighty fact that President Wilson has preserved this nation and its people in a state of profound peace.

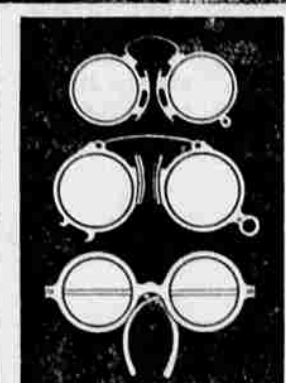
