SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS.

As usual this week has ended with a great uncertainty prevailing as to the status of the relationship of the U. S. and Germany. There are plenty of clouds in the sky; but there is no reason why they should not be dissipated. Germany is a great nation, one of big men, and the two countries should be able to get together in this matter of submarine warfare without blows. Other neutral countries have suffered more than the U. S.; but being small powers they have to take their medicine. One thing is mighty certain, that war is war, with fumes, and all sides are out to win without gloves.

The week has passed without the country much nearer to getting Villa than before, sort of a fox and geese game. Villa is no goose and he knows where to go. How much told about the indifference of the Carranzistas is real, and how much is fiction, is a matter of conjecture. There has been so much that is yellow in connection with the expedition it is not easy to discern the good from the bad.

An unpleasant feature is the request of Carranza that the U. S. get its troops out; but as the request is indefinite and plenty of time is suggested for it this should not cause much concern. If Villa can be gotten at all it ought to be pretty soon.

A matter that may become one of great concern to the people of the west is some trouble brewing between the Southern Pacific and its engineers. An eight hour day schedule has been demanded, and it is already stated this will be refused. This means that when the day comes under the ultimatum there will have to be something doing or undoing. The only comment the Democrat has to make is that it should be settled by arbitration without tying up the business of the country, in which both employer and employees are vitally interested.

Some politics are coming up among the people. Nationally the Democrats are not disturbed, for it is settled that President Wilson will be the only candidate, and not only that, it is practically certain he will be elected. On account of his service to his country he is entitled to a clean campaign, without the customary mud-slinging. This will be accorded him by most of the big papers. In Oregon, though, we may look for the customary dirt.

There is hardly a ripple these days in the affairs of Albany, socially or otherwise, the sailing being smooth. Sometimes this is the case before a storm.
