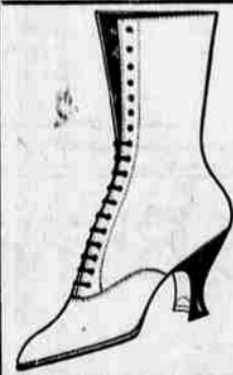
MILLINERY

D. N. Williamson, of Corvallis, is candidate for county commissioner of Benton county. His slogan is: "No bonds, pay as we go for gravel or

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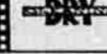
