The association is also working for an endowment or sinking fund, the interest from which will keep up the cemetery after the lots are all sold, and those now interested have passed away. About \$3200 has already been placed in this fund, and it is hoped to have about \$20,000 in it in about five years. Arrangements can be made for the endowment or perpetual care of any lot in the cemetery, the cost of which is \$10 per grave, or as much more as one may feel able to give. This endowment can be paid in small installments, with a note, or can be arranged for in a will. One of the largest gifts to the endowment fund was from Mrs. Chas. Pfeiffer, who gave \$500. Others have signified their intentions of giving like sums and others to remember the cemetery with large amounts in their wills.

The officers of the association are F. H. Pfeiffer, pres.; F. C. Veal, Sec.; C. E. Williamson, treas., and B. Barcher, superintendent.

The board of directors are L. E. Hamilton, D. H. Bodine, F. C. Veal, F. H. Pfeiffer and Mrs. Thos. Hopkins.
