town.
We drove down to the very border, guarded on our side by a single sentry, and a small company a short distance back. Just across the fence, which marks the boundary, is the Mexican guard, housed in adobe shacks that we would think hardly fit for a dog. The Mexicans are not in uniform, and present anything but a favorable impression with their naturally shiftless and uncleanly manner of living.

I took a snap of the guard, who serves four hours' duty on this bleak spot. He is one of the regulars from Vancouver. No one is permitted to go further than a foot across the line. We went as far as was permissible, and had our pictures taken on the line.

The postals I mailed you from Columbus, as well as those herewith enclosed, were taken by one of the sol-

diers. I did not send you those showing the death scenes, as they are too unpleasant—but they have pictures of the prisoners, before and after execution, as well as some of the funeral pyres. The Mexican dead were burned in large pyres, and the process was a slow one, requiring several days before final disposition was made. You can imagine the unpleasantness, as the "wind" was in the wrong direction."

The enclosed currency is Madero money, and is worthless now, but is an interesting souvenir.

Miss Goebel's business detained us until after six o'clock, and some of her friends did not consider it safe for us to be on the road alone, after dark, and so we were supplied with a soldier guard to accompany us home. We were unmolested, although it is not uncommon to pass Mexicans on this road who shout "Vive Villa." We experienced some difficulty in getting through some bad places in the roads. The soil is sandy, and badly cut up by the heavy travel, and our

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION DECIDES LINN CO. CASE

The public service commission has rendered a decision in the matter of the application of the county court of Linn county for permission to construct at grade a road across the railroad of the S. P. near the southeast quarter of the southwest quarter of section 4, tp. 11, S. R. 3 west Will. Mer. The application has been granted placing the road on grade, and not over or under the railroad, subject to revocation for good cause, in event it shall hereafter be necessary to install safety devices at the crossings, or to provide for a separation of grades, a condition being the removal of a small body of timber near the place. The county shall install and maintain the crossing except the part between the rails.

soldier certainly earned his passage to Deming, for he cranked that old Ford fifteen times if he did once. Then something went wrong with the lights, they shone by spells and between the "spells" we swerved just far enough off the middle of the road to have two wheels off, and in direct line with a cement culvert. By quick action Miss Goebel prevented the car from "turning turtle"; the right rear wheel was broken, but we were able to get into town, and considered ourselves most fortunate in escaping without serious accident.

Seven of the wounded Mexican raiders were taken prisoners the day after the raid, and these men were tried here this week. I attended the trial one evening, and found it very interesting, because the prisoners do not understand or speak English, and the questions and answers were interpreted by a Spanish young man, who speaks one language as well as the other.

The prisoners are the lowest type of Mexican peons and according to their testimony were captured by Villa wherever he happened to find them, and forced to follow and obey him. If they refused or tried to escape he shot them. These men presented almost a pitiful condition, dressed in the cheapest of blue denim, with only sandals on their feet, and all of them wounded—one on a stretcher gave his testimony while we were in the court room; another on crutches, and one shot in the mouth. These men all claimed to be taking care of the horses at the time of the raid, but the Mexican is noted for his untruthfulness, and the men were all found guilty of murder in the first degree, and are to be sentenced tomorrow morning. According to the law, these executions will have to take place here in Deming, but as there is a large Mexican population here, it is predicted by some that some other disposition of the men may be made, to avoid possible trouble.

There is strict censorship around Columbus, and I may not safely communicate what may only be gossip concerning present relations between the United States and Mexico. We feel quite safe here, however, and are making all preparation for the first Chautauqua ever held in this section of the country. Tomorrow we are to have an auto excursion, to visit towns as far as sixty miles distant, to advertise the Chautauqua. We expect to visit some of the big copper mines at Santa Rita and other places. We are to have eight autos and about forty

SOUTHERN PACIFIC CO. HAS SERIES OF ACCIDENTS

Two Jonah Days Suffered Along Main Line Between Salem and Roseburg.

The Southern Pacific has been having an epidemic of wrecks and accidents the past two days. Yesterday morning at what is near Isadora station on Rice Hill about 10 miles north of Oakland, special freight train No. 2514 was piled up in a cut and 11 cars were demolished and stacked in a heap. The wreck, which was one of the worst the company has had in recent years, was caused by a broken flange on the wheel of one of the box cars. A tramp who was riding on a car of lumber got both legs crushed and received other injuries. A brakeman was injured slightly.

The night before an inmate of the soldiers' home named Archibald M. Harrison, aged 60, was struck by two engines near Wilbur about midnight while his comrades of the home were searching the country for him. He was in poor mental condition. The engineer saw him 400 yards away, but the man paid no attention to warnings and was struck before the train could be stopped.

At Salem yesterday a freight train was switching and a flat car, one of the old wooden type, buckled in front of the depot. No injuries.

Wednesday a car got off the track at Summit and caused some little trouble for awhile.

IRISH SITUATION GRAVEST SINCE THE WAR BEGAN

Rioting Said to Continue, But Reports Are Censored to the Limit.

London, April 28.—Maxwell arrived in Ireland assumed command of the troops. The point of landing is kept a secret. News from Ireland is censored. The press and public admit the Irish rebellion is the gravest crisis since the war began. It is reported the counties of Meath, Louth and North Dublin are the centers of the rebels' activities.

150,000 PEACE TELEGRAMS.

Received By Congress from All Parts of Country. Claimed they Were Paid For.

Washington, April 28.—One hundred fifty thousand peace telegrams flooded congress this week demanding that there be no break in diplomatic relations with Germany. Messages are still coming, though the numbers are lessening. The estimated costs are a quarter million. Senator Huston desires to know who ordered the telegrams stopped immediately after he suggested a probe of the source of the funds. Shortly after San Francisco reported 10,000 such telegrams, the senders suddenly ordered them cancelled.
