DISTINGUISHED PARTY OF SUFFRAGETTES PASSED

Were on Tour of the Country in
Interest of National
Suffrage.

Passing through Albany Saturday evening, at 7 o'clock, was a carload of 23 of the most distinguished suffragettes of the United States, on a tour of the country in the interest of congressional action in favor of suffrage, in short boosting national suffrage, putting woman on an equality with men nationally, which Oregon has already emphatically endorsed, and has not regretted her action. Elsewhere we give a map showing the course of the trip of the women, showing how they have been covering the country.

The special was in charge of Miss Lucy Burns, of New York City, vice-chairman of the Congressional Union whose picture also appears elsewhere.

The editor of the Democrat, who was at the train, was taken in charge by Mrs. Robert Baker, of Washington, D. C., the press chairman, and was soon in the midst of this striking and strong body of women, who loaded him down with literature.

At Salem the suffrage special made a special stop. The principal talk was that of Mrs. Harriet Stanton Blatch, daughter of the late Elizabeth Cady Stanton, who made a specialty of the position just taken by Roosevelt in favor of national suffrage. She specially showed the opportunity the Democrats have of putting themselves on record in favor of the suffrage of women.
