PREPAREDNESS.

The secretary of war has made some statements in the matter of preparedness of a decidedly interesting character, showing the character of the man at the head of the war department:

"At first the question of preparedness revolved around merely military preparation, but as the war developed in Europe, we learned that these things are but a part of preparedness. We have come to realize the most important kind of preparedness is equally available and useful in times of peace.

"Three-fold mobilization is necessary. In the first place there must be arms and soldiers, ships and sailors, and these must be modern and adequate. On this subject congress is at present legislating and whatever may be the outcome of its deliberations, the executive branch of the government will act in sympathetic cooperation.

"The second mobilization is of our industries and commerce. The war in Europe had been under way before some of the countries were able to equip the men who volunteered.

"It is of the utmost importance that careful, continuous, scientific studies should be made of our industrial and commercial capacity and adaptation, that we should card-index our industrial strength so that we can know it and summon it into instant cooperation so as to take away from it all profit in war.

"If the hour of trial should ever come there must be no war stocks, no war brides, no war fortunes made out of the national danger, nor must there be built up in America interests which could be suspected of preparing to profit by the creation of a national emergency.

"I have not the least doubt that every manufacturing plant could be so related to a central bureau of the government that its special usefulness in time of need would be known in advance.

"The third mobilization that is necessary is spiritual. We must be sure that when the hour of trial comes the banker and the captain of industry will be joined by the workman from the factory and the farmer from the field, with all lesser interests abated and all minor conflicts forgotten. We must be sure one sentiment is animating them all."

TO ENFORCE PEACE.

The president of the Albany College has received a communication from Dr. A. Lawrence Lowell, president of Harvard University urging him to attend the first annual assemblage of the League to Enforce Peace, which will be held in Washington, D. C., on May 26 and 27. Ex-President Taft is president of the league. Dr. Lowell is chairman of the executive committee.

"If, however," Dr. Lowell writes, "you should be unable to attend the meeting, may we ask you to appoint other delegates to represent your institution, either from the faculty or from the board of trustees. We conceive the program of the League to Enforce Peace to be so fundamental to business, industrial and social future of our country, and to the part it must hereafter play in international affairs, that we consider it most desirable that leaders of thought in every community, and especially in the higher institutions of learning shall be fully informed regarding the movement."

All of this sounds well, but, as a matter of fact, it is known that such a thing as enforcing peace is absolutely impossible, with the world in its present moral and religious condition. This is an age of theorizing, an easy thing, something which at least gives men notoriety in the world. Anything, though, that has a tendency to operate for peace deserves consideration.

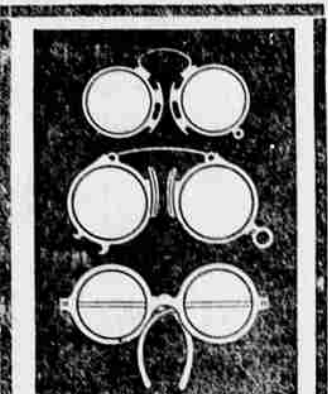
