In the death of Judge W. S. McFadden Oregon loses a citizen who played his part well in the upbuilding of Oregon. He always stood for the best in government, a strong character in his profession. A man of striking personality he put his individuality into his professional work, gaining a wide reputation, reaching out over the state. A lover of stories, he told many. His was a friendship to be valued. One of the first men the writer met after coming to Oregon, was Judge McFadden, then a young lawyer, with a growing practice, and during the many years that have followed his friendship was always appreciated. At the close of his life only pleasant memories come up in connection with the friendship that existed.

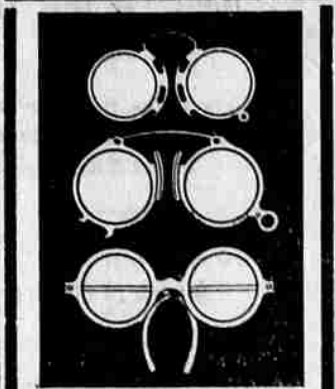
