OBITUARY.

Harry H. Cronise was of German descent, the family having settled in Maryland in the early days of the colonies. He was born in Tiffin, Ohio, July 10, 1851. He was educated in the public schools in Ohio, and later attended Heidelberg College at Tiffin. He came to Oregon in 1875 and located in Josephine county. He later went to Junction City, about which time he entered the employ of the Oregon and California Railroad Co. He returned to Southern Oregon and kept books for a year, to return to the railroad work in Portland in 1882.

He entered the employment of the Oregon Pacific Railroad Co., which later became the Corvallis & Eastern, in 1885 and became agent. He later became purser on the steamboat run between Corvallis and Portland, and for several years was connected with that work. He has remained almost constantly in the railroad business since that time, having been agent of the C. & E. and the Oregon Electric railroads at Philomath, Corvallis, East Portland, Albany, Hillsboro, Wilsonville and finally at Lyons, where he lived at the time of his death.

He was a prominent member of Barnum lodge I. O. O. F., and was a past representative and past noble grand of the order. He was also a member of the United Artisans.

He is survived by his wife, and by two children by a former wife, Mrs. Mable Laughlin, of North Powder, Or., and Kratz Cronise, of Tillamook. A brother and sister, T. J. Cronise and Mrs. Anna L. Trevor, of Salem, and a sister, Mrs. Stella Graves, of Massillon, Ohio, also survive him.

Harry H. Cronise was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. He was kind to a fault, and his many fine qualities made him loved by all with whom he came in contact.

WOMAN MAYOR RETIRES.

Has Had Enough of It, But Had a Great Time Earning \$12 a Year.

Warren, Ill., May, 15.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Angella R. Canfield, the only woman mayor in Illinois, is ready to quit when her term expires next month. She says she has had a good time but she's tired of being mayor.

Mrs. Canfield, who runs a millinery shop with which to help out her years income of \$12 as mayor of Warren is going to close out her business and go to California to live.

"Rounding up my boys, the councilmen, was great amusement," Mrs. Canfield said today. "My aldermen decided one night that they did not want to call me mayor, and would rather call me president. I told them that Webster says mayor formerly meant one who kept herds of cattle. They didn't put anything over on me." Here are some of the improvements Mrs. Canfield has accomplished since she took office.

MARIE EMPRESS A STRONG VAMPIRE WOMAN

CLOSE CALL IN AUTO ACCIDENT AT WENT

Car Barely Missed By Train
on the Woodburn Branch
Thursday Evening.

What might have been a very serious auto accident happened at Went Station on the Woodburn-Springfield branch railroad last evening, when the auto driven by Mrs. Holdredge, of Plainview, in company with her brother, F. L. Beard, of Yoncalla, was struck by train No. 97, in charge of Conductor Robt. Sellers, resulting in a badly damaged radiator, one front wheel and other damages, totaling probably \$100. At the point where the accident occurred the track is partly concealed by an orchard and fence. Both Mrs. Holdredge and Mr. Beard say that the first warning received of the approaching train was given when the train was not more than 50 feet away. Mrs. Holdredge showed great presence of mind in turning the auto abruptly to the left, so that the train just hit it, which act doubtless saved their lives.
