ANNUAL CITY CLEANUP.

Will Start On Monday, May 15, and Last Three Days, in Sections.

The annual city cleanup will start Monday, May 15, and last during the 16th and 17th.

All rubbish must be in boxes, sacks or barrels. No loose rubbish or ashes will be taken, and must not be put in the streets. All boxes and barrels must not be larger than can be lifted on the wagon by two men.

The city will be divided into two sections, and rubbish must be left on the south side of the street intersections.

No rubbish must be put in the streets, only on the morning of the day it is to be taken away. This must

be observed.

The city will be divided as follows: Monday, May 15.—West of Broadalbin to Cottage, from Second to 12th streets.

Tuesday.—East of Broadalbin to Lafayette street, from 1st to 11th streets.

Wednesday.—East of Lafayette to Geary street, from Water to Ninth.
