SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS.

The end of this week sees another crisis practically passed in the long list of critical situations between Germany and the U. S., since the war began. The Democrat at the beginning of the war remarked that disagreements were bound to arise of a very serious character, and that it would take clear heads to weather the storms.

Newspapers often unintentionally show the trend of their allegiance through their news columns. This has been strikingly so in this country. Having persistently advocated a great preparedness some of the big papers have done everything possible to cause war, by constant yellow reports of news, distorted beyond recognition.

Our trouble with Mexico has been smoothly adjusted in the same careful manner that has characterized the administration of President Wilson generally. This is another great achievement accomplished through a waiting policy tempered with justice. The person must be biased indeed who does not appreciate such a service.

There is too much of an inclination among people generally, members of all parties, to place politics before the good of their country, basing their opinions on politics in preference to what is right. This has built up a spirit of jingo in the country that continually jingles in the ears of the people. It is neither a good thing for the country or communities. Men should be big enough not to attack and condemn everything not emanating from their own party.

Whatever the local status in Ireland of the trouble there resulting in a rebellion, one cannot help having a feeling of sympathy for the people of that island through many years of struggle to secure even a limited freedom for her people. They may at times have gone too far; but altogether their freedom has been greatly abridged and their rights hampered. They have been the underdog, held down by laws that have offered little opportunity. Some of the finest names in history have been those of Irishmen, brilliant stars in oratory, poetry and literature.

As peace is a great thing in a nation, so it is in a community, and blessed is the place that is not everlastingly disturbed by neighborhood strife. There are few people who live in such strong citadels that they can afford to throw stones at others.
