PAVING OPERATIONS TO BE STARTED HERE SOON

J. W. Travis, who has the contract for paving some of Albany's streets is due to arrive here today to begin work on his contracts. Washington street from Ninth to Thirteenth, and a block on East First street are contracted, but it is expected that before long bids will be called for for paving on Calapooia from First to Ninth, a much needed improvement, and perhaps from Fifth to Ninth on Elm street. There is also talk of extending the paving on Third street from its present terminus to Main, and there are other small blocks that will receive attention.

Petitions are now out asking for the paving of Santiam road from Main street to Geary and Salem road from Main street to the city limits. These petitions are being signed freely and will no doubt be allowed by the council and the improvement made without protest.
