Albany and Eugene—

Next Friday afternoon, on the high school ground Albany high and Eugene high will play their second game of base ball, at this city, on the junior high grounds. The former game was close, and this promises to be also, with a chance in favor of Albany. Twenty-five cents admission fee will be charged.

On Way to Minneapolis—

Rev. and Mrs. S. A. Douglas, of Grants Pass, formerly of the Albany church, arrived in the city last night, and are spending the day here with friends. Rev. Douglas will go to Minneapolis to attend the northern convention of the Baptist church, and will be gone three weeks. During his absence Mrs. Douglas will visit their sons, Olin and Earle, students at the O. A. C.

At Lebanon—

Rolla Ralston and Wm. Robertson, members of the Fortune Hunter cast, were out at Lebanon yesterday afternoon in the interest of the presentation of the play "The Monday Evening." It will be given at the Lebanon theatre at 35 cents, any seat in the house, and will no doubt have a big house, which the play deserves.

River Boat Damaged—

Issues Useful Book—

Postmaster C. H. Stewart has a supply of pamphlets on postal information that are handy affairs. The little 40 page book is a condensation of the large code of postal laws, regulations and rulings. The principal information contained in the Postal Guide is condensed and given the public in the little book. Copies have been supplied to the commercial department of the high school and they are being used as texts in teaching this information to the commercial students. An effort will be made to get them into every high school in the country next year. Postmaster Stewart is authority for the statement that if the general public were better posted on postal laws millions of dollars would be saved to the government annually.

GALLOWAY HOLDS COURT

IN DEPT. NO. 2 TODAY

Three Divorces Granted and Other Cases Heard and Set For Trial.

Judge Galloway came up from Salem this morning to hear the arguments in the case of the Moyer Estate vs. Stephens-Russell Co., but owing to the absence of the defendants, the case was postponed. At this time, however, a number of minor cases were brought up, four suits for divorce were heard and three granted, one couple deciding to go back and live together again.

In the case of W. H. Hammersly vs. Hulda Hamersly, for divorce, the demurrer of defendant was overruled and defendant given 10 days in which to answer.

The case of W. P. Elmore, executor of the estate of H. B. Mayer, vs. Stephens-Russell Co., was brought up this morning and postponed until June 22 on account of the inability of one of the defendants to be present. Divorce was granted Annie E. Kirk from John W. Kirk on the grounds of cruelty.

In the case of Norma Cooper, vs. Harry Cooper, decree of divorce was granted plaintiff.

The case of Davis and Houston vs. First National Bank et al, was set for trial May 29 at 10 a. m.

In the case of G. W. Waterbury vs. Clyde F. Carlos and wife, to enjoin defendant from disposing of goods and property, demurrer submitted without argument, overruled and defendant given until May 25 to file answer.

Lulu Armstrong and Arthur Armstrong settled their differences and decided to go back to the old life. The case was withdrawn and dismissed.
