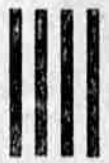


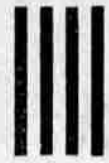

TWELVE LINN CO. PEOPLE AT THE STATE GRANGE

Leading Subjects: Cooperation, Rural Credits and O. C. Land Grant.

Grants Pass, May 9.—The Oregon state grange met this morning at 10 o'clock in the Kerley hall, this being its 43rd annual session. State Master C. E. Spence presided. All other officers were present. Those from Linn county are Hon. C. L. Shaw, Albany, of executive committee; Mrs. E. R. Allen, Tangent, lady assistant steward; Mrs. Vinnie Reed, Lebanon, Ceres; Mrs. Lulu Miller, Albany, of the woman's work committee; C. H. Walker, Albany, chaplain.

Delegates present from Linn county were William Cook, Mrs. Jennie Cook, of Morning Star Grange; Heike Ohling, Mrs. Winnie Ohling, of Western Star Grange; D. W. King, Mrs. D. W. King, Holley Grange; Mr. Helen Vaughn, Fox Valley Grange.

Committees on credentials reported 98 delegates present, from 29 counties. Fraternal delegates seated were Frank A. Sikes of the Farmers' Union and E. J. Stack, of the State Federation of Labor.

The State Master's annual address showed that the greatest advance during the year made by the grange was along cooperative lines, citing the results obtained in Lane and Hood River counties, in marketing farm products. These counties also showed the largest increase in membership. Other points touched upon were Rural Credits, and the O. C. land grant upon which he recommended strong resolutions, for the last named demanding 40 per cent of the sales for our public schools.

Mr. Sikes of the Farmers' Union, Mr. Stack of the Federation of Labor, were heard in some eloquent words. At 6 p. m. a magnificent banquet was served by the ladies of Grants Pass. Splendid music was furnished by the Grants Pass Brass Band of some 20 instruments.

Toasts and speeches enlivened the occasion. Grants Pass is a beautiful city nestled in a valley surrounded by mountains, calling to mind the psalm lines, "As round about Jerusalem, the towering mountains stand."

Hersberg, of Independence; chaplain, Cyrus Walker, of Albany; steward, M. P. Young, of Clatskanie; assistant steward, Charles Hays, of Sheridan; lady steward, Mrs. E. R. Allen, of Tangent; Pomona, Mrs. U. D. Mihells, of Grants Pass.

The 1917 session of the grange will be held at Astoria.
