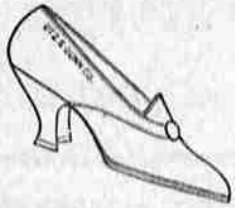

PICTURES OF ALBANY'S OLD TIME BANDS SHOWN

A Window of Albany's First Band of 1859 and Other at Dawson's.

In the show window of the Dawson Drug Store are being shown today several pictures of Albany's bands, of special interest because of the fact that they include the oldest band of the city, giving them historical value. A large number have inspected them during the day. They are as follows: 1859.—With the following members: M. W. Mack, H. C. Godley, J. Godley, J. McKibben, W. C. Tweedale, D. W. Wakefield. Only one, W. C. Tweedale, continues a resident of the city. D. W. Wakefield resides in Portland, and J. C. Godley also. 1870.—Will Miller, John Spangler, Pat Farrell, W. C. Tweedale, Henry Flindt, Ike Conn, Star Maley, Walter Mozee, Chas. Maley and Harry Godley. Mr. Tweedale is also the only one left of this band in Albany and a majority of the others are dead. Hayseed Band.—Sometime in the '90s. Among the members were Frank Wood, Press B. Marshall, Bert Westbrook, Owen Beam, Claud Vunk, Jim Coon and Dick Rodgers, now residing here or near here. Albany College Band, of about 20 years ago.—Among the members were Jim Coon, leader; J. C. Irvine, Wayne Bridgeford, David Gottlieb, Del Burkhardt and the Smick boys. Simonton Concert Band.—Also in the '90s. Besides Prof. Simontotn, there were S. N. Steele, Claud Vunk, Wayne Bridgeford, Bob Ashby, Will Hand, Ollie Rowell, Owen Beam, Jim Coon, Riley Hulbert, and Bernard Marks.

An old time picture of the Miller orphans is also given, with the following in it: L. E. Blain, F. M. French, here yet, Walter and Geo. Turrell and Geo. Furry, of Seattle, Gus Staiger, Jim Titus, Pete Wilson, Haven, Dr. Eaton and Cal Burkhardt.

N. M.
