POLICE MAKE IMPORTANT ARREST OF BAD CRIMINAL

"No more honest work for me, I'm going to ditch these 'gats' and get me a Winchester when I get out of here and I'm going to stick up every person I see that I think has any money. No use trying to live an honest life."

The above came from one Fred Roberts as he was being taken to the county jail yesterday by Chief of Police John Catlin after being sentenced to serve 25 days for carrying a concealed weapon.

The arrest of Roberts was one of the best pieces of work pulled off by the local police in the past few months. Sam Worrel did the trick Monday morning when Roberts got off of the northbound train at 4:00 o'clock. Owing to the large number of robberies which have been occurring south of here the police have made it a rule to search all hoboes coming in from the south, and as Roberts came down the track Worrel eyed him suspiciously. Roberts avoided the night officer's gaze and then he was told to stop. A large .38 calibre Colt's Army revolver was found on him and he was marched down to jail.

When searched later by Chief Catlin and Worrel a complete house breaker's and safe cracker's kit was found on the prisoner. His complete outfit, which he claims he saw another man hide in a pile of ties and later took, consists of the revolver described, a small flash light, six keys for the unlocking of the inner doors of vaults after the outer doors are blown off, a skeleton key for entering houses, four small files for fitting keys, a razor and other articles. The revolver was loaded and kept in a cloth case, and the keys were carried in a small cloth case which was saturated with 3 in 1 oil to prevent rust. In the jail Catlin later found a vial with the smell of "soup" in it which he evidently had emptied in the sewer before he was searched.

He was tried before Judge Lewelling, acting in the absence of Justice of the Peace L. L. Swan, and fined \$50 for carrying a concealed weapon, receiving 25 days in the city jail.

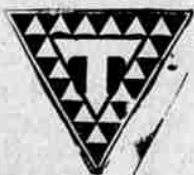
