MARKET REPORTCattle—Receipts show a very nice
increase. The market opened at the
old rate. Pulp and grain fed steers
sold at prices ranging from \$8.50 to
\$9.00 the bulk around \$8.95, calves
were rather scarce and a price of \$8.00
was reached. Cows were here in fair
numbers no change in the price—not
many bulls stags or heifers and the
prices were unchanged.Hogs—Dealers were well pleased

5000 head coming in. The market op-
ened a little weak but gained strength
later. Top price was \$9.15, bulk of
sales at \$8.95 to \$9.05, a few sales at
