to raise good crops. The mixture of grasses which Dr. Shaw has assembled will grow in this kind of soil and will thrive under the conditions where he has tried it out. He is of the opinion that it is especially adapted to much of the land of Western Oregon and Washington and will be found extremely valuable. Dr. Shaw makes no secret of his discovery and freely gives it to the public. The formula is as follows:

For each acre of land take 2 pounds of sweet clover, 2 pounds of common red clover, 1 pound Alsace clover, 1 lb. mammoth clover, 1/2 pound small white clover, 2 pounds orchard grass, 2 lbs. rye grass, 2 lbs. meadow fescue, 2 lbs. Kentucky blue grass.

The land should be well cleaned the year before by growing some cultivated crop to get the weeds out—some crop like corn, potatoes, etc. This mixture should last from year to year without replanting and should produce twice as much as at present. This is similar to what is being done in England and Scotland.

Weather Report—

The report of the weather bureau shows the rainfall for the 24 hours preceding 8 o'clock this morning to have been .17 inches and the temperature between 62 and 48 degrees. The river fell to 5.3 feet.

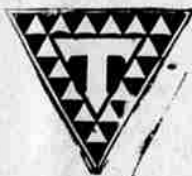

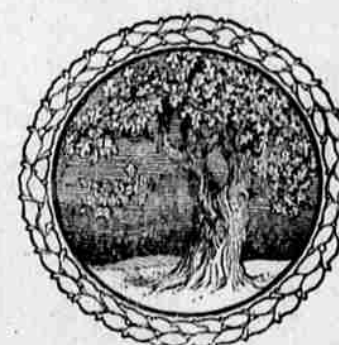
