PRIZE WINNERS AT FAIR.

Will Be Given Free Scholarships and
Be Sent to the O. A. C. Sum-
mer School.

Arrangements have just been com-
pleted by J. A. Churchill, Superintendent
of Public Instruction, for sending
the boys and girls who won the cap-
ital prizes in the industrial club work
at the state fair last fall to the Ore-
gon Agricultural College for the Boys
and Girls' Summer School. Twenty-
one children were successful in win-
ning these prizes at the state fair last
September. The capital prizes consist
of membership in the short course at
the agricultural college with all ex-
penses paid. It represents the highest
award in each project offered in the
industrial department at the State
Fair last year. The prizes are made
possible through contributions made
to Superintendent Churchill for the
furtherance of this work by public-
spirited men and women of the state.

SIMPLIFIED SPELLING.

The University of Oregon Has De-
cided to Have Simplified
Spelling.

Three alternatives were adopted, as
follows:

Adopt for use in publications and
correspondence of the institution the
simpler and shorter of alternative spell-
ings authorized by the dictionaries
consulted as authorities by the institu-
tions.

Adopt the twelve words adopted by
the National Educational Association.
These words are program, catalog,
decalog, prolog, denagog, pedagog,
tho, altho, thoro, thorefore, three, and
thruout.

Allow students in written work to
use, when such indicates a consistent
and intelligent spelling habit, any spell-
ings to which any of the leading dic-
tionaries give vocabulary place as rec-
ommendations of the American Philo-
sophical association, the British Philo-
sophical, or the Simplified Spelling
Board.

Miss Muriel Saling, of Pendleton,
daughter of the county clerk, has been

MULTNOMAH PROBLEM.

A Writer Tells of the Enormous
Profit in the Construction of
Columbia Highway.

In the Oregon Country, of Port-
land, Aman Moore, gives some start-
ling facts in reference to the building
of the Columbia highway, so much
talked about. Here is a little of several
pages:

The scheme was so carefully manipu-
lated that the work was almost entire-
ly done through prominent citizens;
through made-to-order good roads as-
sociations and through public offi-
cials. These men, no doubt, were sin-
cere good roads enthusiasts, blinded
by the unseen power that directed the
entire propaganda, under the guise of
a good roads movement, but which, in
reality, was only a stupendous scheme
to sell to the county almost one mil-
lion additional square yards of bitu-
lithic copyrighted brand of 2-inch
topping of asphaltic concrete road
surface, spread over 4 inches of crush-
ed rock, naming it "Warrenite" after
being finished, and calling it a "per-
manent pavement," with profits real-
ized in royalties and in construction
work of approximately 50 per cent of
the entire amount of the \$1,250,000
proceeds derived from the bond issue.

(Then come some long tables of fig-
ures.)
The people of Multnomah county
can see clearly from the above state-
ments what became of approximately
half of their \$1,250,000 bond issue of
last year, when almost one-fifth of
same, or \$228,127.77, went to Boston
as royalty alone, and probably a large
amount was made in profits by the
construction or "subsidiary" compa-
nies of the paving trust.

May 22.—Marshfield—Much street,
sewer and sidewalk work is being

Logging Co., including 5-1-2 miles of
logging railroad to Mr. Pendleton,
who represents large capital.
Portland—Oak timbers cut from
trees on lower Columbia will be uti-
lized in building ships at Portland and
other coast points.
St. Helens creamery has output of
600 lbs. daily, \$2000 monthly payroll.
Grants Pass—Million feet of lum-

ber ordered for construction of beet
sheds and silos at sugar beet factory.

Canyon City—Asbestos mines oper-

asbestos to Portland market. This is

working in the United States.

ber company and will operate same.
