BOY KILLED BY HORSE.

Son of Lieut. Butler Killed By Horse at Douglas, Ariz., Dying Yesterday Afternoon.

Thomas J. Butler, county commissioner, last evening received a dispatched from his son Lieut. Clifford Butler, U. S. A., 22nd infantry, on border duty at Douglas, Ariz., that his grandson and namesake, Thomas J. Butler, had been killed by being kicked in the head by a horse. The boy and his parents were in Albany for some time last year. He was a loveable boy, and will be sadly missed.

Lieut. Butler has been granted a month's leave of absence, and he and Mrs. Butler will take the body of the son to West Point for burial. He was seven years of age, and had just started to school.

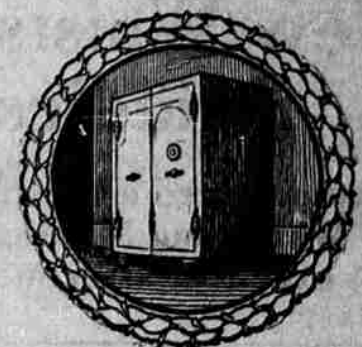
