BIGGEST GRANGE IN THE COUNTY HAD HOME COMING

Morning Star Started With the
Largest Charter Membership
in the State.

Last Saturday was "homecoming" day for Morning Star Grange, a most enjoyable season. DEATH OF MRS. WATTS.

Mother of Two Former Albany Printers, Passed Away at Lafayette Recently.

Mrs. Caroline E. Watts died at Lafayette recently at the age of 89 years. She was the mother of Sid Dorris and step-mother of C. W. Watts, both printers and residents of Albany for a number of years. The latter died in Dawson, Alaska, the former has been residing with his mother at Lafayette. Mrs. Watts was a pioneer of 1845, settling at Lafayette in 1847, where she afterwards resided, the last 41 years in the same residence. She was married to Felix G. Dorris, having six children. Mr. Dorris died, and in 1870 she married Dr. Watts, prominent as a physician and public speaker. Mrs. Robert S. Shaw, of Astoria, resided with Mrs. Watts while a girl. She was a splendid woman, of strong personality.

MEMORIAL SERMON AT THE BAPTIST CHURCH SUNDAY

Rev. Young Delivered Sermon
on Battle of Lord Before
Large Audience.

The annual memorial sermon, under the auspices of the G. A. R. Ladies of the G. A. R., and Spanish War Veterans, was delivered by Rev. G. H. Young yesterday afternoon at the Baptist church before a good sized audience that appreciated the able address. His subject was fighting a good fight, or the battle of the Lord. He said the United States had passed through three crises; in 1776, when we fought for religious and civil rights; in 1861, when we fought against slavery and dismemberment, and in 1898, when we fought to lift up a suffering people, the Cubans. These were enlarged upon, showing how our battles have been for God and humanity, in true valor and true blood. A fourth crisis may now be in our midst.

The pulpit was prettily decorated with flags, and good music was furnished by the choir of the church.
