TEACHERS FOR HIGH SCHOOLS

University of Oregon to Have a Special Facility for High School Training.

University of Oregon, Eugene, May 29.—A new facility to improve training of teachers for Oregon high school staffs will be established at the State University in September. The state universities of California, Missouri and Wisconsin, and the University of Chicago and Columbia university, New York, are among those that already have it.

The facility is a university high school. The one in Eugene will begin with the seventh, eighth and ninth grades, and the higher grades will be added as needed until six years of work are included. No tuition fees will be charged, and pupils from any part of Eugene will be eligible. The school of education will direct the work. Pedagogical experts will carry the bulk of the actual work so that student teachers may observe the methods; the latter will get opportunity to put the principles into practice. The plan is expected greatly to add to the qualifications of the many students which the university sends yearly into high school work.

ELECTRICITY FOR FUEL.

Low Rates Being Offered to Users of Electric Ranges by the Oregon Power Company.

"The housewife's dream of a 'House without a Chimney' will soon be a reality," says Manager White of the Oregon Power Company. "Many homes are now so completely equipped with electrical appliances that no chimney is necessary. The Western States are leading the country in the use of this new household servant and a conservative estimate places the number of electric ranges now in use on the Pacific Coast at over 10,000."

Manager White is inaugurating an educational campaign on the use of household appliances and has secured the services of the General Electric Company's appliance demonstrators who will visit all the consumers of the Oregon Power Company in this district to show and demonstrate the latest electrical devices in the home.

PORTLAND WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REPORT

Portland, May 30.—Cattle—The receipts were very light, only 494 head being on the market. This consisted of California grass stuff, a feature of the receipts was the beginning of the Mexican steer run for the season. They sold well at \$8, the balance being natives of very poor grade. The top price reached today was \$8.50 for grass fed steers the bulk going at \$7.90. Cows were very scarce; also heifers and bulls, no change in prices. There was a falling off in calf receipts this week but the prices were unchanged.

Hogs—A large run of hogs was received, approximately 5000 head being placed on the market. The top price reached was \$8.85 the bulk going at \$8.65 to \$8.75. Market closed rather weak.

Sheep—A fair run was received this week and placed on the market. Lambs are now selling at \$9. Wethers reached a top price of \$8.25 bulk, selling at old rate, no change in ewes, very few being received.

Big Hog Shipment—

A car load of hogs from the Nebergall Packing Plant consigned to the Jones' Market, in Portland, left the city this morning. The shipment consisted of 8,000 pounds of dressed pork.

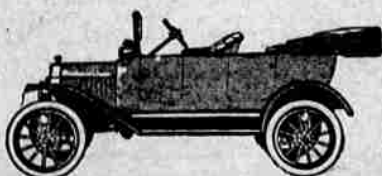

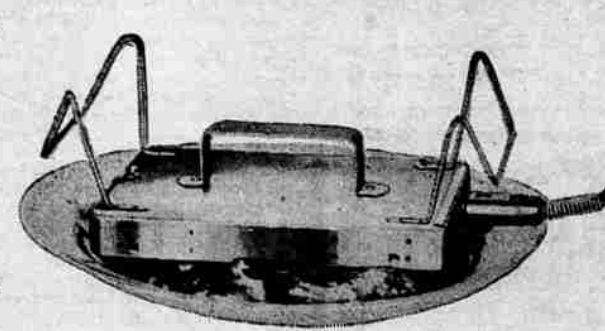
