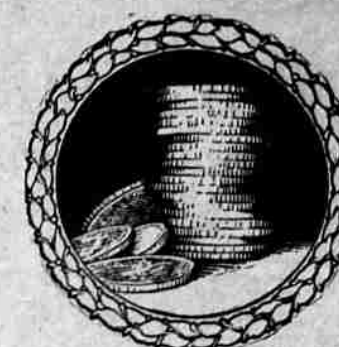

Seven different companies were making these machines and all of them were infringing on the patents of the Oregon company. They are now all eliminated and the local company has the field to itself. Machinery is being ordered for the plant in this city and the factory will be modern in every respect. The company has advance orders for 500 machines.

### WILL GET \$50,000.

Eugene Bible University by Raising \$200,000 Will Receive the Hill Gift.

Eugene, Or., May 31.—On the day of the funeral of James J. Hill, railroad builder and pioneer in the development of the great Northwest, telegrams sent from Eugene tonight announced that the Eugene Bible University had raised a fund of \$200,000, fulfilling the condition attached to an offer to the school of \$50,000 made by Mr. Hill two years ago. The date was the time limit on the Hill gift. A permanent endowment fund of \$250,000 for the school is thus created.

The announcement of the success of the campaign was made by President E. C. Sanderson, of the university. Two telegrams were sent to St. Paul announcing that the fund was complete. One was addressed to John T. Toomey, Mr. Hill's agent, and the other to his son, Louis W. Hill.

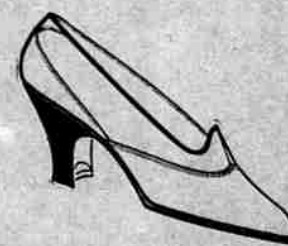
