EUGENE MAN'S BARGAIN.

Bought Postage Stamps at Half Price
and Then Had to Pay the
Government.

The Eugene man who bought a large quantity of postage stamps at half price certainly got what was coming to him when the government took the matter up and made him return those unused and pay for those used. The Eugene Register says: The story of how a Eugene business man bought a lot of stolen postage stamps at a bargain rate from a postoffice robber, how he thought he was ahead of the game and how a postoffice inspector compelled him to give up what he had not used and pay the government for those which he had already used, came to light yesterday when the inspector visited the city the

second time on the case.

The postoffice at Natron was robbed about two months ago. The next day, or soon afterward, the thief, who was later caught, came to Eugene, and, according to facts elicited by government detectives, bought a quantity of wax paper from a local store to place between the sheets of stamps so that they would not stick together, and placed some of them in a bundle of clothing which he checked to Portland. Not having enough money with which to buy a ticket to that city, he set about to sell the remainder of the stamps. He approached the business man in question and offered to sell the stamps at half price. The business man thought it was a bargain and bought the stamps, as he always has use for a large number each year. It is said he accepted the thief's offer and paid him just half their face value.

BUSINESS HAS GAINED.

Dun Says in Wholesome Characteristics With Sustainment of Consumption

Continuing remarkably prosperous, business has gained in wholesome characteristics through the recent cessation of price advances in certain commodities. Sustainment of consumptive demands in unprecedented volume with costs rising rapidly has been an economic phenomenon for months past, but that ultimately a point would be reached at which buying would slacken was obvious. Evidences of abatement are by no means general and nothing indicates diminished purchasing power, yet in branches where forward requirements are already largely provided for some hesitation, with shrinkage in new orders, is natural. Such symptoms become more apparent in steel and iron, though foreign contracts remain noteworthy, and a few materials and products are yielding, with premiums for prompt shipments less frequent. This does not imply that the great basic industry has receded from its exceptionally strong position; most producers are covered far ahead, in some instances into the first quarter of 1917, and view the lull in domestic business with equanimity, if not with indifference. Manufacturers in other important lines are similarly situated; textile and cotton mills are assured of full operations for some time to come and many footwear factories will not close down for customary stock-taking this summer, while leather tanners are more anxious to catch up with deliveries than to make additional commitments.

RECENT MEMORIAL PROGRAM

A Member of the G. A. R. Gives Expression to Appreciation of and In Making Event Success

(By a Veteran)

Deeply grateful to the people of Albany for their help in making Memorial Day exercises, 1916, such a gratifying success, the veterans of McPherson Post No. 5, G. A. R., and the Ladies of Fair Oaks Circle No. 1, G. A. R., take this method of expressing their thanks. One of the most imposing processions ever seen in Albany marched out to the cemetery now most beautiful in all its history the well cared for Riverside Cemetery.

The start was made from the Armory where more than the needed automobiles furnished by the Albany Commercial club, A. L. Fisher, president, came to carry the veterans and Ladies to the cemetery. Seated in the front car was aged grandfather, E. C. McClain in his 91st year, the only Indian War Veteran present, of the very few living today. Capt. F. C. Stellmacher of the Spanish War veterans, with his aids had charge of the procession. The boys' drum corps, under Chief of Police John Catlin, led the automobile contingent. When these reached the court house square a fine looking army of school children, with flags waving greeted the veterans, then marched across the street and fell into line headed by Lady Hattie Stillson, patriotic instructor of Fair Oaks Circle. The Albany High School Band led the march. Many citizens thronged the walks on either hand. Entering the cemetery from its southeast gate, with its imposing stone columns, the school children formed into two lines and fittingly honored the veterans and ladies as they passed through. When the G. A. R. burial grounds were reached the members of Post and Circle formed in line facing the flag, it flying at half mast in center of plot. Patriotic Instructor C. H. Walker began the ceremonies by reading a paper given to him entitled "Memorial Day," and following this, read Lincoln's address at Gettysburg cemetery Nov. 19, 1863.

The reading was prefaced by the remarks that it is said "Lincoln was less than five minutes delivering the same, that he felt he had made a failure," but not so. This address is now one of the choicest classics in American literature, and has been translated into 27 different languages. Following these readings Superintendent of the Albany Schools, C. W. Botticher, delivered the memorial address, listened to by the expectant multitude with intense interest. Many compliments were given the speaker. The members of the G. A. R., superintended by Commander E. F. Sox, having gone through the ritualistic work, pertaining to memorial services, the firing squad of the O. N. G. delivered three volleys, ending the

WHISKEY FOR BEER.

Roseburg Officers Unearth a Scheme for Getting 24 Bottles of Whiskey a Month.

In the most sweeping raid ever attempted in Douglas county, special officers sent to Gardiner by Sheriff George Quine and District Attorney George Neuner confiscated 456 quart bottles of whiskey from the warehouse of the Gardiner Mill Company. The liquor was brought to Roseburg and is being held by the sheriff.

The consignment, which was shipped from San Francisco on board the steamer San Gabriel, comprised 19 separate shipments of 24 bottles each. It was consigned to 19 separate persons and the bottles were labeled beer.

The officers contend that in purchasing the liquor the consignees had whiskey substituted for beer in order that they might obtain 24 quarts each 28 days instead of two quarts, as allowed under the prohibition law. It was intimated by the officers today that warrants probably would be issued for the persons in control of the boat on which the liquor was brought to Gardiner.
