DIVERSIFIED FARMING.

One of the best authorities in Oregon on the wool situation recently returned from an extended trip over the range country, and in the course of a conversation, said, among other things, that the small farmers of this country are the ones to whom we must look for our future mutton supply; that the big ranges were being cut up by the dry farmer, and that it would be a small farm proposition with a few up to a few hundred sheep. Most people like to think of the sheep industry in terms of bands of 2500, also to think of large ownerships of from 25,000 to 50,000. They are almost unable to see that a few sheep on every arable acre in the state will double and treble the output in season and out of season. This paper has dwelt on diversified farming as the secret of a successful country. History will no doubt repeat itself, and many people will rush into sheep and hog raising at the present hog price, only to be bitterly disappointed when livestock prices have one of its inevitable slumps. Many of these will sell out on the low market and condemn forever the livestock business. The consistent farmer is the man who raises the greatest variety of crops in rotation, most of which he feeds to livestock on his place. He is not concerned about the ups and downs of the market. His first thought is to make his livestock fat enough to go on the market in the shortest possible time, and the day it is right he ships it to the stockyards and turns his mind to the finishing of another bunch of livestock. He also knows that he must have purebreds in order to secure the earliest maturity. He fights shy of the scrub and considers a long price paid for a well-known sire a splendid investment. He is the man whose buildings are well painted, whose machinery is under cover, and whose land is well fenced, and down in the village bank you will find that he has a very satisfactory balance. He is a man also who isn't afraid to be considered somewhat of a book farmer, and all of the latest bulletins in the agricultural college will be found coming to his mail box. He is pretty apt to be an influential member of the Grange, and his farm is rather in the nature of an experiment station to the entire county. He himself is a keen business man; knows that he is honest and is willing to allow that business men of the city who handles his products are likewise honest; above all, he does not sit up nights belaboring big business, but rather uses his best efforts in cooperation. We are doing all we can to eliminate the scrub, let's eliminate the "in and out," a menace to successful livestock industry.—Live Stock Journal.

TEACHERS' HOMES.
