LIBRARY NOTES.

The Empire Builder has been honored by having his picture enwreathed in flowers and his "Highways of Progress" displayed.

Lord Kitchener's picture now receives a tender tribute from Oregon roses.

Mrs. A. H. Martini has given a beautiful plant to the children's room.

Mrs. L. E. Tracy has furnished a rotogravure of the National Federation of Women's clubs in convention in New York City.

A Shakespeare shelf may now be seen in the exhibit case. Among the interesting pictures may be noted the death masks, the Chandos portrait and Albany's paintings; famous actors as Henry Irving, Furness, Robertson and Ellen Terry in their celebrated roles; the Henley edition and Moulton's Shakespeare as a dramatic artist.

For the month of May 48 books in literature were circulated; 36 in history; 39 in travel; 46 in sociology.

Twenty-one new readers enrolled in May; 41 books were donated.

One of the girl readers has begun her seventh card, having read 288

books. One little boy reads from four to five a week. He is almost a daily visitor.

Oftentimes six books by Harold Bell Wright go out in the same day. It happens frequently that five or six of Gene Stratton Porter's novels are in the daily circulation. Another may be seen talking out seven books for the family reading, proving that the library is appreciated.

Miss Wieder has recently classified all the Farmers' Bulletins from the U. S. government, making them easily accessible. Agriculturists can find much valuable information in these.

The books on horticulture will also interest specialists. Loganberry culture is well presented in several bulletins.

The U. S. government sends several booklets on irrigation that ought to be read by our patrons. The Silver Lake, the John Day, and the Ochoco Project present very interesting details of the great reclamation work going on in Oregon. Mr. John H. Lewis, state engineer and Mr. John T. Whistler, reclamation engineer, write the books.

The last Extension Monitor from U. of O. is devoted to the Commercial courses. It is full of suggestion.

Mr. Douglass, librarian of the university will give a course in library science at the summer school. High school teachers will have a good course in administration, and instruction in cataloging.

The state librarian is planning a meeting for the librarians of central Oregon for the last week in June at Salem. Among the subjects for discussion will be "City School Libraries" and "County Libraries." Members of library boards are urged to attend. Sectional meetings for studying library problems have been very successful in Washington.
