SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS.

If one viewed the European war this week from the Verdun side of it the result would show in favor of Germany; but if the whole miserable affair is considered from both sides the balance is probably a little on the side of the Allies. The Russians have been taking the aggressive in a live campaign. Just what has been the matter of Russia for several months is an enigma. At a time when there should have been an aggressive campaign so little was being done that the Germans were able to move large bodies of soldiers to Verdun, much needed there. Any kind of strategy would have suggested action. The name British is used so little in the dispatches one wonders what the English are really doing.

In the United States the Mexican trouble has had to take a back seat for the Chicago Republican convention in session several days, with a long preliminary, lasting several weeks. The disturbing element in the matter has been former President T. R. Roosevelt, one of the most striking characters in history, who from his roost at Oyster Bay has looked down on proceedings, like a cougar in a tree, ready to spring at a second's notice. A mass of aggressiveness whatever he does at least attracts attention, and among a good many does more, creates an enthusiastic following. Unquestionably he is not the man for the present emergencies. The government is fortunate in already having that man at its head. The nearest in temperament to the present executive is Justice Hughes, the nominee, who though, has not been tried, a man without the poise of President Wilson.

Albany this week demonstrated the fact that it is an ideal convention city. In this case grand ledge city, being splendidly equipped for taking care of several hundred men and women in a manner that is not only satisfactory, but eminently pleasing. Those here this week, a fine body of representative men, used to the best, were warm in their praise of Albany and its entertaining advantages.

The public school children are now out in the open, with bridles off, ready for the long vacation. If spent in idleness it will be worse than wasted; a detriment rather than an advantage. The profit should be evident at the end of the season. Experience, tho, has demonstrated that most students are damaged by vacation, and this has caused quite a movement looking towards a continual school year. In fact Newark, N. J., has already inaugurated this.

Youth, though, is an age for recreation, and undoubtedly the vacation is a proper thing. Just how long it should be though, may be a matter for debate.
