HEAVY SNOW IN MOUNTAINS DELAYS WORK OF RANGERS

Owing to the depth of snow in the mountains back of Cascadia the Forestry service has been unable to do much work back in the hills. C. C. Hall, local supervisor has made two trips into the mountains lately and found on Minto Mountain and other peaks from five to 10 feet of snow. Work is being done to some extent in the lower places, cleaning out trails and telephone lines and preparing to start the season's work of constructing new trails and lines as soon as possible.

A new device has been received that will be a great convenience to the rangers and stations. It is a portable telephone, a little device weighing but three pounds. It is made of aluminum and will slip into the pocket. With a wire to throw over the telephone line the ranger can telephone to a station, or to any ranger in the woods with a similar device. It also is equipped with a signaling device with a buzzer that works on the principal of an electric auto horn. Five of these phones have been received as this district's allotment for this year.

An Odd Resolution.

The Thomas amendment reads, "No judge of the supreme court or inferior court shall during the continuance of office or for two years thereafter, be qualified, or eligible to any elective office under the constitution."
