OLD GLORY HONORED

the possibilities of self-government. "Our government has shown itself ideal, also, in its ability to guarantee the safety of the individual citizen. Not a generation had passed over its history until it was compelled to and did successfully defend its citizens against the aggressions of the mother country. Moreover, it was the first of all governments to defend its merchantmen against piracy, and make its flag respected and its commerce safe in all countries and on all seas. And

our latest diplomatic triumph has secured the restriction of submarine warfare for the protection of our citizens on the high seas.

The nation stood also the test of its ability to preserve its own existence under the stress of internal strife. Our Civil War was, in some respects without a parallel in history. It was this war that Lincoln declared was the test of the possibility of the endurance of free government. The people of a large portion of the nation were firm in their persuasion that human liberty was menaced when the national government sent its armies into their commonwealths to enforce the nation's laws. There were millions who were not convinced in their minds that ideal political order depended on the victory of the Stars and Stripes. But today the thinking world realizes that Lincoln was right. The political destiny of a continent was fought out in that war, and the nation had a new birth of freedom, and the Union was firmly established and vindicated.

"There is still another test to which the ideal political order must submit itself. It is the test of international relations. The one uncivilized and unchristianized remainder of life is the international area. The most mischievous relic of barbarism in so-called Christian civilization is the unshamed and unrepudiated glorification of international war. It is this that has thrown the nations of the Old World into the greatest, the bloodiest, and the most cruel war that the world has ever seen. What position shall we assume in the face of this great catastrophe? Experience is teaching us that, as in the private feud, so in international war, no one member suffers alone. War anywhere means loss and confusion everywhere. The day must come—and soon—when the public opinion of the civilized world will declare, through a league of the

world's parliaments, that the peaceful industries of peaceful nations must not be disturbed by the war programs of those who will not keep the peace. When that hour strikes our nation must take a leading part.

Self-government, personal security, liberty and union, world peace—these are the political ideals reflected in the folds of our country's flag. The flag embodies the purposes and history of the government itself. It records the achievements of its defenders on land and sea. It attests the struggles of our army and navy and the valor of our citizens in all the wars of the Republic. It has been consecrated by the blood of our best and our bravest. At the sight of it every loyal American heart throbs with holy emotion. It was never assaulted that thousands did not rise up to smite the assailant. The inheritors of an ancestry which for generations have never yielded to a foe, have avenged wrongs, have vindicated right, have fought and died for their own liberty, and more, have fought and died for the liberty of others, have today, as they will have under the inspiring spirit of liberty for all time, that dominant spirit which makes their country powerful, keeps their institutions pure and permanent and enlarges their own freedom."

A quartet, Messrs. Irvine and Watson, and Mmes. Davis and Fagan, were heard in a splendid patriotic song, when the Elks presented a pretty ritualistic service out on the pavement, well set, with J. J. Collins, exalted ruler, presiding.

L. G. Lewelling gave the flag record, the lodge officers erected a floral bell and Fred Dawson gave the Elks' tribute to the flag.

A class of girls gave a splendid drill with flags, and the big crowd sang America, the band playing, closing a patriotic exercise that will long be remembered.
