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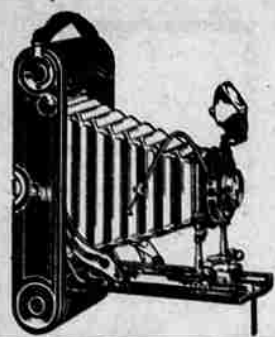

### ORIGIN OF LINN COUNTY TRACED AT BROWNSVILLE

The First Court House Site Is Located By Two Pioneer Women Yesterday.

No more successful picnic was ever held by the pioneers than the one which came to a close at Brownsville Thursday evening. A new touch was given the reunions this year by C. H. Stewart, of this city, and Prof. J. B. Horner, of Corvallis. In his address Mr. Stewart brought out the point that the reunions should be a clearing house for historical information, and that the pioneers should come together with an idea of giving out information that would clear up points in the early history of the county that are not certain.

Judge Stewart, as president of the Linn County Historical Assn., and Prof. Horner, of the history department of O. A. C., as a member of the Oregon Geographical Board, are trying to locate the old emigrant train through the state, and mark it with monuments. An interesting thing brought out at the Brownsville picnic was the explanation of the trail.

The old trail entered Linn County at Milton Hale's Ferry, at what was Syracuse, 1 1/2 miles west of Jefferson. It came up east and crosses the present county road about a mile south of Jefferson. From there it continued up to the hills and crossed near Knox Butte. Then it strikes San Ridge and follows along the edge of the foot hills to Kirk's Ferry, or the present site of Brownsville. Following out from there it keeps along the foot hills to Spore's Ferry, at the present site of the town of Coburg, on the MacKenzie River.

A grand daughter of Mr. Spores was at the picnic, a Mrs. C. O. Milligs, of Coburg. Her father, Wm. Hawk, was the first to take up a residence on the present site of the city of Lebanon.

Perhaps no more interesting thing came up than the location of the original seat of the Linn County government.

A companion of Rev. Marcus Whitman, the missionary, on his trip to the coast, was Dr. H. H. Spaulding. When Rev. Whitman and his family were slain Dr. Spaulding was some miles from Walla Walla and was overlooked by the Indians. The next spring Spaulding brought his family down to the Willamette Valley and took up a land claim east of Brownsville between the claims of Capt. Jas. Blakeley, and Hon. Hugh L. Brown.

No sooner than Spaulding had erected his cabin than he enlisted the aid of his neighbors and erected on his place a school house and went to teaching.

In December 1848, Linn County was created by the provisional legislature, and in the following March General Joe Lane arrived and set up a territorial government and ordered the election of county officers. This election occurred the next October. On Dec. 11, following, these officers assembled and organized the first government in Linn County "in the school house on the Calapooia."

The house was located about a mile east of Brownsville on the north side of the road. Two women, Mrs. Moyer, a daughter of H. L. Brown, and Mrs. Sarah Walker, a daughter of Mrs. Naomi Dennison, a widow woman who crossed the plains, were taken to the place in automobiles and located the spot where the old school house stood. This was done from some old trees which were recognized.

The original county of Linn was considerably larger than at present. It was bounded on the north by the Santiam from its mouth to its source, and thence to the summit of the Rocky Mountains; on the west beginning at the mouth of the Santiam and up the Willamette to its source, and to the California line, then east to the Rocky Mountains and north along the summit of the Rocky Mts. to the north line.

### AT SANTIAM MINES.

Considerable Activity Reported Up in the Hills. Mine Sold for \$100,000.

Scio Tribune: R. E. Peery came down from the Crown mines a few days ago. He reports a new quartz vein uncovered at the point where they wish to start their tunnel. The mineral obtained from this vein, he thinks, is a mine within itself and will more than pay for development.

It is the purpose to put a force of seven men at work at once in driving the tunnel. A saw mill will soon be erected to saw all timber and lumber needed for the development of the mine.

Mr. Peery reports that the Black Eagle mine has been sold for \$100,000. The new owner says that enough valuable ore has been placed in the dump to have paid all the debts and development expenses of the company.
