**PLAN OF IRRIGATION IN
CITY TO BE CHANGED**

Hours Increased to Eight,
Users to Irrigate Only
Every Other Day.

Statement of the council to the citizens of Albany:

At the meeting of the council held Friday night, the 16th inst., the Oregon Power company outlined a contemplated change in the hours for using water for lawn sprinkling and irrigation purposes. It seems that the hours now in effect are satisfactory, as a general thing, to users of the service, but the water company finds the present demand for water for these purposes is greater than can be taken care of without endangering the purity of the water for domestic purposes and jeopardizing the fire protection of the city.

The plan outlined by the water company contemplates dividing the city into two districts, or sections, with Ellsworth streets as the dividing line, and a rearrangement of the hours for lawn sprinkling and irrigation. The proposed change will require all water users west of Ellsworth street to irrigate on the even dates of the month, and all water users East of Ellsworth streets to irrigate on the odd dates of the month.

Under the new arrangement the hours of irrigation will be increased from 6 hours a day, as at present, to 8 hours a day, and because of the division into two irrigating districts, each using the service every other day, the pressure will be increased and better and more satisfactory service provided than at present.

The new plan will go into effect Tuesday, June 20th, and the council believes the proposed change will provide a more satisfactory service than the present arrangement, and will afford more adequate fire protection and also maintain the purity of the water for domestic purposes.

It is of the utmost and vital importance that the fire protection of the city be maintained and the purity of the water insured, and while the council has no direct control over the situation because of the fact that the water company is subject to the jurisdiction of the public service commission, yet the council requests the citizens of Albany to cooperate with the water company in this matter, as the council believes that it is for the best interests of all concerned and the water company is using its best efforts to furnish adequate and satisfactory service.

Upon being interviewed regarding the proposed change Manager White of the Oregon Power Company made the following statement:

"The existing rules covering lawn sprinkling and irrigation service were placed in operation several years ago and we now find, because of the demand which has steadily increased during the past three years, that the

existing arrangement is not feasible from an operating standpoint and because of this increased demand we are not able, under present rules, to give the customers the service we desire.

"Irrigation service is only required during a few months of each year and is therefore strictly seasonal business creating an unusual demand during the summer months. Conditions in Albany are similar to those elsewhere, even in cities where they have a natural gravity supply. It has been necessary in nearly every city throughout the country to prescribe rules and regulations governing the use of water for irrigation purposes. Under present rules all consumers of the city irrigate during the same hours of each day and we find it impossible to provide sufficient pressure during irrigation hours, without drawing our reserve supply of filtered water down too low to insure the amount of water necessary in case of fire, without speeding up the rate of filtration to such an extent as to possibly endanger the purity of the water for domestic purposes.

"Commencing with next Tuesday, June 20th, the city will be divided into two irrigation districts, one east and the other west of Ellsworth street, and the consumers of each district will be required to use the irrigation service on alternate days, those in the west district using service on even dates only and those in the east district on odd dates only. The length of time for irrigating will be increased from 6 hours to 8 hours per day, apportioned as follows: From 6 to 10 o'clock forenoons and from 5 to 9 o'clock in the evenings. With the increased pressure which will be possible under the new arrangement, we feel confident better service can be furnished and we ask the cooperation of our patrons and respectfully request each of them to observe the rules in order that the new arrangement may have a reasonable chance to demonstrate its advantage to all concerned. Each consumer will, within the next few days, receive a circular letter from us, fully explaining the new arrangement.
