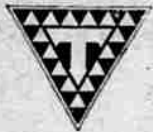

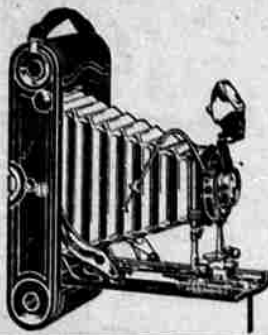

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ALTHOUSE WILL FILED IN PROBATE COURT

Albany and Illinois People Are Named As Beneficiaries.

The will of the late John W. Althouse, who died June 10, was today admitted to probate.

P. A. Goodwin, a nephew of Mr. Althouse, is named as executor. The estate is given as having a probable value of \$4500. The beneficiaries of the will are as follows:

To the nieces of deceased, Elizabeth Merrill, Mary, Annie and S. Katherine Althouse are given the residence property at Fifth and Baker streets, who are to share it after paying to the estate the amounts paid out on paying.

P. A. Goodwin is directed to distribute the personal effects and household goods as he sees proper to relatives and friends of Mr. Althouse.

To Walter Althouse, aged 69, of Wilmington, Ill., a brother, and to Elizabeth Knapp, aged 79, of Loveland, Colorado, a sister, are bequeathed \$100 semi annually until 10 such payments have been made. PARIS OVERTURES TO U. S. IMPORTERS

To Form a Franco-American Alliance of Fashions.

SOME NOVELTIES FOR 1916

Barrel Skirts and Algerian Pelerines Are the Most Striking Features. French Will No Longer Dictate the Modes to the American Woman if the Present Plans Go Through.

A circular letter has just been sent out in Paris to American buyers for the big stores and to leading New York importers by the Chambre Syndicale de la Couture Parisienne, signed by M. Aline, the president, and by M. Douillet, the former president, inviting them to attend a meeting at the American Chamber of Commerce to form a "Franco-American alliance" to settle the difficulties affecting the dressmaking trade. The letter says that "owing to the importance given to the question of Paris models and to the measures taken by certain dressmaking concerns and by the American press" the chamber considers it advisable to study with the chief representatives of the New York houses what methods shall be followed for the common good.

As the Chambre Syndicale Parisienne includes all members of the Couture Defense Syndicate except Polnet and Worth, it is expected that a satisfactory agreement will be reached and the Couture Defense Syndicate eliminated.

At the recent fashion show in Paris the tonneau, or barrel skirt was a notable feature. It is quite distinct from the pannier, running in a convex line from the waist to the bottom of the skirt instead of puffing at the hips, as the pannier does. Tailor modes and evening gowns for young women attracted special attention. A striking novelty was serge satin fallie walking coats embroidered in metal on the hips or in wide bands around the bottom. The predominant colors were mauve and various shades of violet.

The features of the Becca collection were circ gowns and coats and striking debutante frocks.

Premet and Bernard had larger collections than last year, the latter, as usual, showing elegant tailor made suits. Their tonneau skirts for gowns were less successful owing to the use of small hoops at the sides of the hips to produce the barrel effect, which gave a bunched appearance instead of a harmonious line. The colors were chiefly somber.

Margaine-Lacroix, little heard of since the introduction of the Directorate skirt, came back with a very successful collection, whose feature was the red or blue Algerian coat copied from the voluminous cloak of the Spahis officers. Utilizable either as a cloak or pelerine, it is certain to be widely copied and worn everywhere. Long pelerines, almost reaching the ground, to cover the entire dress, shown by almost all the houses, form one of the season's most popular notes as the only style of over wear falling gracefully over the new skirts.

Some Styles For Men.

Buttons will be distributed on men's coats this season according to the height of the wearer. It was announced at the opening of the annual convention of the International Custom Cutters' association in Kansas City, Mo. The short man will have a one button sack coat; the medium sized man will have two buttons on his coat; the tall man will get three buttons, or four if he is tall enough. This decree was embodied in the report of the styles committee of the association.

The committee reported that the form fitting coat would still rule as correct, but that it would be longer and bear a narrower lapel and narrower collar than last season. Spring coats will be skeleton lined, unpadded and will run to crescent shaped patch pockets.

Full dress coats will be longer in front, the collar and lapels narrower, and there will be an outer breast pocket. The white silk vest should be "U" shaped, and there should be narrow braid on the trousers.

The coat to the dinner suit will have the outer breast pocket bound in a narrow strip of satin, and the lapels also will be faced with satin. The vest to the dinner suit will be of black silk, close fitting and "V" shaped.

PENSION FOR CARNEGIE.

It Bill Passes Congress His Civil War Services Will Be Recognized.

A civil war pension for Andrew Carnegie would be possible under the terms of the bill introduced by Senator Kern. The measure is designed to place on the pension rolls "any person who served ninety days or more as a military telegraph operator and who has received or is entitled to receive a certificate of honorable service in the military telegraph corps of the army of the United States."

Inasmuch as Andrew Carnegie served as a military telegraph operator to the civil war, the opinion has been expressed at the capitol that if the bill is enacted the former steel magnate would be entitled to the pension.

The Story of a Famous Hymn.

The famous hymn beginning "God moves in a mysterious way," known as "Cowper's Hymn," had its origin as follows: Cowper was all his life the victim of melancholia and more than once attempted suicide. One day, bent upon destroying himself, he got into a cab and ordered the driver to take him to a certain point on the river where he intended to drown himself. The cabman, noticing his strange appearance and feeling that all might not be right with him, drove him about the city and finally stopped in front of the poet's door. Stepping out and recognizing the old familiar surroundings and shocked at the thought of his narrow escape, Cowper exclaimed, "God moves in a mysterious way his wonders to perform," and, rushing in, immediately composed the immortal hymn.

The Louvre.

The Louvre dates away back to the reign of Dagobert in 628. In 1204 it was a prison and in 1364 was made into a library. The new building was begun by Francis I. in 1528 and enlarged and adorned by successive kings, principally by Louis XIV. But it was Napoleon I. who gave the Louvre its real glory. Turning it into a museum, Napoleon deposited in it the finest collection of paintings, statues and art treasures known in the world. The magnificent buildings of the new Louvre were begun by Napoleon I. and completed by Napoleon III. about 1857.
