FULL WEIGHT AND MEASURE MUST BE GIVEN CONSUMERS

Laws Being Enforced By State Bureau to Prevent Short Measure.

Spence Wortman, of the state department of weights and measures, was in the city Friday visiting the grocery stores, ice works and wood dealers in the interest of the laws governing weights and measures. Mr. Wortman states that the law in regard to full measures will be enforced as rigidly as possible. He handed copies of the state law to all grocers with the request that they be distributed among farmers and fruit growers who sell their products here.

In Portland, he said, the bureau increased the pack on strawberries from 15 to 25 per cent. A full pack was insisted upon in every case. Some boxes are well filled before leaving the farms, but the joggling of the wagon and the heat shrinks the berries. Dealers were made to fill their boxes. At 15 cents a box he said the cost of a crate of berries sold at the usual rate costs the consumer \$7.20.

The same scrutiny will be kept on other berries just coming in, and on other fruits. The box must contain all that is claimed for it.

With regard to wood, coal and ice, Mr. Wortman said the same ruling would be enforced.

Extracts of the law to which he calls particular attention are as follows:

Berries.
The "standard" box used in the sale of berries must be of one of the following capacities: 67.2 cubic inches or 33.6 cubic inches, which equal in volume the (old) dry quart and dry pint. These boxes may be of any form or shape but they must be so constructed as to hold the required number of cubic inches. A "purchaser" when buying berries is entitled to receive the box (level) full of berries.

Standard Boxes Provided.
The standard boxes or baskets used in the sale of strawberries, blackberries, loganberries, raspberries or similar berries shall be of the interior capacity of 67.2 cubic inches (dry quart) or 33.6 cubic inches (dry pint), and it shall be unlawful to offer or expose for sale or sell strawberries, blackberries, loganberries, raspberries or similar berries in boxes or baskets of other than standard size; provided, that nothing within this section shall be construed as in any way preventing the sale of strawberries, blackberries, loganberries, raspberries or similar berries by weight or in boxes or baskets of a greater interior capacity than 67.2 cubic inches.

Wood, Coal, Ice.
Regulating Sale.—Firewood shall be sold by the cord or fraction of a cord; coal shall be sold by the ton or fraction of a ton; ice shall be sold by weight, and in all sales of firewood, coal or ice, a definite statement shall be made to the purchasers as to the amounts or quantities thereof. (Laws 1915, Chap. 161, Sec. 7.)

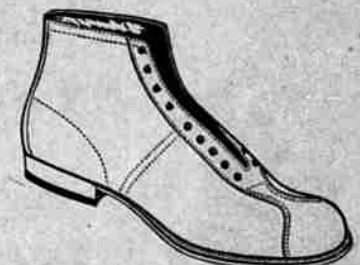
