WHACKS ROOSEVELT.

The Fatherland, a German newspaper, published in New York, whacks Roosevelt in the following live manner:

Theodore Roosevelt is beaten. He has lost not because he is anti-German, but because he is anti-American. The man who places another country before his own can never triumph in the United States. Roosevelt was obsessed with Anglo-Saxonism. In his heart there burns an intense admiration for Great Britain. He could never forget—like so many other Americans who have fallen under the spell of English ideals—his delightful experiences as a lion among the leaders of "our mother country." The virus had gotten into his blood. And once this virus inoculates itself into the veins of an American he is lost to America.

Theodore Roosevelt was lost to America when he became the chief British propagandist in the United States. His attitude towards the European war alarmed even those good people who are satisfied to make money out of the world-wide carnage. "The things that we would have done" after the sinking of the Lusitania and other incidents did not calculate to inspire confidence.

It is to the everlasting credit of the hyphenates that the Rough Rider's conspiracy was nipped in the bud and that its hero was exposed to the light of day. Future historians will honor the work of those greatly abused Americans who saved the country not only from participation in "the most stupid and senseless war of history," but also from dissensions at home which would have ripped the Union wide apart. For the third time in American history, in the days of Washington, in the days of Lincoln and again in our own day the hyphenates have saved the country. At Oyster Bay, where Theodore Roosevelt is now sulking, let us hope that in the peace of quiet and oblivion he may revise his English-made conception of Americanism.

PRESIDENTIAL YEARS.

There is a respectable list of presidential years which have been seasons of unfavorable business. Such years as 1884, the "Blaine-Cleveland contest," or 1896 and 1900, the "Bryan years," will at once occur to mind as having been marked by financial and industrial disturbance. The "Roosevelt year," 1904, was a season of trade reaction and unsettled markets. When, however, the other electoral years in the series are examined, the precedent is not altogether so convincing.

Notwithstanding a temporary atmosphere of hesitation in several of them, most of the other presidential contests of the past generation have been accompanied with at least a satisfactory measure of business prosperity. This was certainly true of 1880, when an exceedingly bitter political campaign failed to disturb the notable forward movement of the day in American finance. It was equally true of the last presidential election; for, although the shifting of control from the Republican to the Democratic party clearly indicated from the beginning of the canvass, 1912 was a year of rising markets and reviving prosperity. The most inveterate partisan had to confess, after election, that the campaign, although foreshadowing change in the tariff and revision of the currency, had exerted no visibly bad influence of any kind on the business situation.
