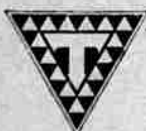

THREE DIVORCE CASES FILED HERE TODAY

Two Women and One Man Ask For Separation From Spouses.

Suit for divorce was filed today by Nella L. Deane against Charles A. Deane. The complaint alleges cruel treatment, violence, false accusations and desertion. Plaintiff asks for custody of Nola S. Deane, a minor child, aged 2 years, \$25 per month alimony and \$250 suit money. Defendant is said to be working in mines at Kellogg, Idaho.

Allan P. Howells has filed suit for separation from Elizabeth Lane-Howells. The cause is stated as desertion. The couple was married in Portland June 10, 1911, and defendant left plaintiff May 28, 1915.

Joanna F. Gray asks in a complaint filed yesterday for separation from John W. Gray. They were married in Linn county, April 18, 1912. No children were born, but plaintiff has three children by a former husband. The common complaint, that defendant called her vile names, accused her of being untrue, and intimidated, with other men are charged in the complaint.

Plaintiff asks alimony of \$50 per month during the time suit is pending, \$300 attorney's fees and cost money, one-third interest in lands worth \$20,000, and half interest in another tract.
