DOWN IN MEXICO.

It looks as if war is inevitable with Mexico. If it comes it cannot be a very long affair, for Mexico is in no condition to fight a country like the United States, and is bound to be beaten in whatever engagement occurs bigger than a bushwhacking affair.

The machinery is crumbling and only an unexpected, right-about-face in Carranza's method can prevent the government's complete disintegration, this official declared, even long enough for it to be replaced by a government sufficiently strong to prevent near anarchy in the southern republic.

Such a situation has been prophesied for months by some war and state department officials. Because the administration, as repeatedly announced, publicly has insisted on giving the Carranza government every chance to restore Mexico to a real status among nations, such official prophets have been given scant hearing. In some instances administration officials have declared such prophecies have been unconfirmed by official reports, saying unsettled conditions exist only in isolated cases.

Official themselves pointed to the note sent Carranza as evidence that President Wilson and Secretary Lansing are finally convinced that some other than Carranza and some other government than the present defacto structure is needed to bring Mexico out of her ten year period of revolution, rebellion and internecine strife.

War department officials declared that, in the event of real trouble, they expect no more than two or possibly three real engagements. But there would still be left the more serious work of policing and pacifying the country south of the Rio Grande. It would not be a matter, they say, of taking two or three strategic positions by force of arms, and then retreating with the established government for peace, but they are convinced that one or two decisive victories for American arms would break any remaining hold Carranza has on the Mexican government.

FUTURE OF MOVIES.

A prominent author of movies says: The first development, which is already in progress, will be toward longer reels or, rather, longer productions. Instead of having half a dozen different plots shown in one evening, or even two or three, the entire evening will be devoted to one production.

"Such plays can be produced much better than shorter ones. In other words, the movie theatres are bound more and more to take the place of the regular theatres, with one evening devoted exclusively to one cast and one play.

"These longer plays will inevitably lead to long runs. For instance, instead of the movie houses in New York thinking that they must have a change once or twice a week they will be content to run the same production for several months or an entire season. After a play runs in the leading theatres of five or six big cities the production will be shown in other cities. Gradually it will appear in smaller and smaller places.

"This gives a long life to the play, a life of at least five to ten years. This has its commercial as well as its sentimental value. Although the price to the theatre for the use of the reels will decrease as the size of the city decreases, yet the number of cities in which the production will be shown will rapidly increase as their size diminishes.
